
Welcome

College History and Ethos


Digby Stuart College owes its existence to the Society of the Sacred Heart, an order of French Sisters who came over to England in 1842. The rich history of the Society in the education of women, and the dedication to issues of social justice and equality, now provides our college with a common concern for fostering a kind and loving community, where we welcome students of all faiths or none.

Digby Stuart Today

We are the largest of the four colleges at Roehampton. The new student residence, Elm Grove Hall, brings our resident student numbers up to eight hundred. The College still retains gardens and beautiful spaces in between the many buildings, such as the Vatican Garden, a hidden, leafy, green space just off the busy Digby Square. The College is home to four academic departments, English and Creative Writing, Social Sciences, Humanities and Drama, Theatre and Performance. We strive to give everyone a sense of belonging, in a community that cares about individuals.

We have a regular programme of social activities and events which appeal to all different tastes, such as our annual lecture and a summer strawberry tea. The Chaplaincy base is also located at our College, which organises a lunch every Tuesday!

The College mascot is the lion, and the Digby Lions football team competes with the other colleges in the annual football match, drawing huge crowds. Our elected student leaders are an important voice in how we conduct business at the college and help us be responsive and relevant.

Froebel College

College History and Ethos

Froebel College is one of the oldest higher education establishments in the United Kingdom, having been founded in 1892. The College takes its name from Friedrich Froebel, a German educational pioneer, who encouraged the use of play as an important part of a child's development.

Students and staff take advantage of our extensive lawns, gardens and walkways, centered on Grove House, dating from 1792, and surrounding an ornamental lake providing a beautiful environment for relaxation or social activities.

Froebel Today

The focus on education continues to this day, with the School of Education being a major part of the college and a leading centre for Initial Teacher Education. The internationally renowned Department of Dance is also resident at Froebel College, with its superb facilities and modern dance studios. Froebel College is also home to the Roehampton Students' Union, the Union Bar and the Roeactive Gym.

The Froebel community is sociable and friendly, and students quickly find a home in a supportive and positive environment.

The Froebel College football team are the 'Zeebras', and alongside the College Cup there are plenty of opportunities for students to support or take part in friendly inter-college competition and activities. Froebel has an extensive calendar of social events including a formal freshers welcome dinner, the College Christmas Dinner, a summer celebration and many other smaller on-campus or off-campus events organised by our student leaders.

Southlands College

College History and Ethos

Southlands was founded in 1872 to train women to teach in Methodist schools in some of the poorest parts of Britain. The College today welcomes all people as students, building on its history by encouraging young people to develop strong values and to grow as future leaders for their communities.

Southlands Today

Life at Southlands is busy and diverse. We have an exciting annual calendar of events, including termly dinners, a fireworks party, music gala dinner, Southlands Shindig (our summer fête) and College boat party. Our large social space is a café during the day and each evening transforms into a cinema and hub for student-led events.

Southlands offers a number of leadership development opportunities, including roles on our college officer committee and with the Southlands Venture: a volunteering programme which funds student-led projects in the local community. Our mascot is the Shark and our College sports teams – the ‘Sharks’ and the ‘Sharkettes’ – are a credit to our community, succeeding in sport and also running fundraising and campaigning efforts.

Rebuilt completely in the 1990s, Southlands has wonderful facilities that sit around a large, green ‘quad’, which our students love. Our performance spaces make Southlands the hub for musical activity across the university and from our Methodist chapel and Muslim prayer rooms our chaplains run worship and community events throughout the year.

Our community of staff and students shapes what we do today and how we will grow in the future. Whether you join us by living at Southlands or as a non-resident student of our departments – the Business School and Media, Culture and Language – we very much look forward to welcoming you here.

Whitelands College

College History and Ethos

Whitelands is the oldest of the four colleges, founded in 1841 by the Church of England, and was the first institution in England to provide higher education for women. We celebrated our 175th anniversary in 2016. Whitelands continues its close association with the church, whilst welcoming students and staff of all faiths and none.

Whitelands Today

With its beautiful grounds, fine buildings, and self-contained flats, Whitelands is a close and friendly community. The common room, The Sett (our college mascot is a badger), is on the first floor of Parkstead House. With its glorious views, daytime café facilities and evening bar, it is an ideal setting for socialising at any time of the day, and is the venue for a range of parties and other leisure activities.

The College has an exciting calendar of events throughout the year. In addition to our traditional May Day celebration (running since 1881!), we host formal dinners each term; a Christmas fair, carol service, and dinner; and Science Week, together with many other smaller social events organised by our student leaders. All are open to resident and non-resident students, and to staff.

Whitelands is home to two academic departments – Psychology and Life Sciences – and the Ministerial Theology programme. It is an ideal environment for students, and there are a number of quiet spaces for private study situated throughout the buildings. Whether you live in or travel in for your classes, you will find plenty of opportunities here to enrich your experience of life at university.

International students

At Roehampton, we are committed to excellence in teaching and research and we can offer you an excellent opportunity to study and live away from your home country.

The UK has a world-renowned reputation for excellence in education. Everything you expect from a UK education is reflected at the University of Roehampton, from our world-class teaching staff and excellent career support, to our history-rich campus buildings and warm welcome.

We are very proud of our diverse and multicultural student body. International students make up a substantial portion of the population on campus, and this is embodied in the various culture-based clubs and societies at our Students' Union.

Support for international students at Roehampton is second to none, and starts before you even get to campus with our pre-arrival activities, dedicated contact support and airport pick up service.

Our International Office staff make regular visits overseas to meet prospective students and offer advice on courses and visa applications. We also offer new international students a dedicated welcome and orientation programme.

Language support

International students who don't speak English as their native language are offered free English language support tutoring if required, for more information please see the team in Richardson Building.

Pre-sessional English language courses 5, 10 and 15 week courses

These courses are ideal for students who are offered a place on an undergraduate course, but still need to meet academic English requirements. You will improve your academic English so that you can cope better with university study, develop your study skills and learn what is expected of you as a student in the UK higher education system.

The length of course depends on your level of English. Once you have successfully completed the course, you will be enrolled automatically onto your chosen undergraduate degree course with no need to re-take an English language test.

What will I study?

- Essays: how to use your reading in essays and skills in organisation, criticism and analysis.
- Academic vocabulary and grammar development.
- Seminars: presentation and discussion based on your reading.
- Lectures: understanding the argument, note-taking, playing an active role.
- Listening and reading: understanding key ideas in an academic context.

Benefits of the pre-sessional?

- 24 hours' tuition per week from highly-qualified lecturers in English for academic purposes.
- Weekly individual tutorials to work on your specific needs in writing.
- Teaching in small classes – usually 8 to 16 students.
- All books and materials provided for your classes.
- Access to the University Library, languages centre and 24-hour computer suites.
- As part of our social programme we organise trips to famous London attractions to help you get to know the city and spend some fun time together as a group.

The International Foundation Programme is offered in conjunction with our partners QA Higher Education. There are two pathways, one if you are looking at progressing onto a business degree, and a generic pathway for non-business degrees. Both courses are designed to prepare you for seamless transition onto an undergraduate programme.





London is undoubtedly one of the world's greatest cities; home to international businesses, world-famous cultural institutions and the centre of UK politics. It offers a wealth of theatre, food, music and sport and almost half the city is made up of parks and other green spaces.

The University of Roehampton is situated in south-west London, with the largest of London's Royal Parks, Richmond Park, situated a 10 minute walk from campus. We are a short bus ride from Putney and Hammersmith, each offering a range of bars, restaurants and shopping facilities, and Barnes, a beautiful village with traditional pubs, a farmers market and boutique shops, is a short bus or walk away.

This map highlights a small selection of London landmarks that are within easy reach of our beautiful campus.

Living costs

Aside from your course fees, there are additional costs that you should take into consideration when budgeting for university. This is a rough guide.



Rent £450–£550 pm

Rent ranges from approximately £114.45–£169.05 per week on campus. If you choose to rent off-campus the average cost is £450.00–£550.00 per calendar month. Some rents are exclusive of bills and you would need to budget an additional £60 per month. Deposits range from the equivalent of four to six weeks rent.

Food £120 pm

Students are, on average, spending £30 on weekly groceries.



Phone bill £50 pm

Most students pay £50 per month on contract or £10/12 a week on pay as you go.



Travel £50 pm

Social life £140 pm

Roehampton students spend an average of £35/40 a week.



Books and equipment £25 pm

It varies from department to department – on average students spend £300 per academic year on books, but using library services can considerably reduce costs.

Gym/sports £13.30 pm


Our campus gym membership is normally £160 for 12 months, however there are deals on offer throughout the year.

For the truly elite athletes studying at Roehampton, we offer a range of bursaries and scholarships.



Most students applying for undergraduate study will do so via UCAS (www.ucas.com).

You can apply for up to five courses at UK higher education institutions using the UCAS service. Please note that UCAS do charge a fee for submitting an application using this route. Once we receive your application from UCAS, we aim to make a decision on it within a few days.

Once you have heard back from all the institutions you have applied to, you need to decide which application will be your 'firm' choice (first choice) and your 'insurance' choice (second choice). During the time it takes for you to make your decision, we will contact you by email, phone and occasionally by post with more information about studying with us.

You may submit late applications up until 30 June 2018; however, please be aware that if courses become full, we may not be able to make offers on late applications. After 30 June you will only be able to make an application via the UCAS Clearing service.

International students from outside of the EU have the option to apply using the application form on our website at any point in the year.

When do I repay the tuition fee and maintenance loans?

You don't start repaying any loans until the April after graduation and only once you are working and earning more than £21,000 a year.

If your income drops below this threshold at any point then your repayments would also stop. You repay 9% of your income above £21,000. After 30 years, any outstanding loan is written off.

Public transport

The University of Roehampton is in zone three of the London transport system, just 30 minutes from central London.



National Rail

From Barnes station, the main campus (Digby Stuart, Froebel and Southlands Colleges) is a 10-minute walk and Whitelands College is a 25-minute walk, or a short ride on the 72 or 265 buses. Trains go to Barnes from Clapham Junction and Waterloo in one direction and Kingston, Richmond, Staines and Windsor in the other direction.



Underground

From Hammersmith (District/Piccadilly/Hammersmith and City/Circle lines), take the 72 bus from stop K in the lower bus station next to the shopping centre (above the Underground station). From Putney Bridge (District Line), take the 265 bus outside the station.



Bus

The University is well served by buses that link Roehampton to Hammersmith, Richmond, Kingston, Putney, Clapham Junction, Wimbledon and New Malden. The 72, 265 and 493 buses stop next to the main site and close to Whitelands and Mount Clare (at the junction of Danebury Avenue).

The 170 and 430 buses stop on Danebury Avenue, which is very close to Whitelands and Mount Clare and a short walk from the main site.



Car

Please note, parking is limited on campus and in nearby streets. All University sites are on or near the A306 Roehampton Lane, between the A3 and the A205 South Circular (Upper Richmond Road).

Postcodes for satellite navigation systems are as follows: Digby Stuart and Southlands College SW15 5PU, Froebel College SW15 5PJ and Whitelands College SW15 4JD.

Tariff points

In September 2015 qualifications were reformed across the UK at both level 2 (GCSE) and level 3 (A Level, BTEC, Access etc). UCAS developed a new way to calculate the tariff points associated with each qualification in line with this structural change.

Any students applying for entry to university from September 2017 onwards are likely to be affected by these changes.

What the new points mean to you

- All qualifications currently on the UCAS tariff will continue to attract points under the new system.
- The new tariff points are based on an approach which used the qualification's size and grades to calculate its total tariff points.
- The numbers are much lower, for example an A level grade A* gets 56 points under the new tariff, in comparison with 140 under the previous tariff.
- You'll still need to achieve the same grades at A level, Scottish Advanced Higher, Scottish Higher or BTEC, or in any other qualification you're taking to meet higher education course entry requirements.

– The new UCAS tariff points should not have any impact on your decisions about qualification choices at school or college, or your preparation or application to a higher education course.

– The AS is now 40% of an A level – this is more accurate according to qualification regulators.

All courses on UCAS have been listed with the new tariff since May 2016.
