

Fees and funding

Our postgraduate fees are competitive, with several funding options available.

Fees for postgraduate courses vary depending on the type of course and subject. For the latest postgraduate fee information check the course information on our website or visit **www.lsbu.ac.uk/pg-fees**.

If you're a self-funding student studying for a whole year (two semesters), you can pay in full and take advantage of a 5 per cent early settlement discount. Or you can pay by an initial down payment of 50% followed by two equal instalments. If you're a recent LSBU graduate, you may qualify for a tuition fee discount. Sources of funding Postgraduate study loans

If you are starting your first full Masters course, studying either full- or part-time, you may be entitled to apply for a £10,280 postgraduate study loan. For more information, visit www.lsbu.ac.uk/pg-fees and www.gov.uk/postgraduate-loan.

PGCE teacher training

At the time of publication, Home and EU PGCE students can take out a tuition fee loan from the Student Loans Company in the same way they can a standard undergraduate loan. Bursaries are also available for some PGCEs depending on your qualifications. Find out more at www.education.gov.uk/get-into-teaching.

Professional and career development loans

Professional and career development loans are bank loans to pay for courses or training to help with your career, available to students living in the UK. Loans are offered at a reduced rate and the government pays interest while you're studying. You can borrow between £300 and £10,000. For more details, call the National Careers Service on **0800 100 900** or visit **www.gov.uk/career-development-loans**.

Graduate loans

Most high street banks offer graduate loans, although you often need to hold a current account. These loans generally have a lower rate of interest than a personal loan, but you need to undergo a credit check. Compare and apply for graduate loans at www.moneyfacts.co.uk.

Employer sponsorship

Many employers are willing to sponsor their employees on a full-time or part-time basis as part of their career development. So it's always worth asking if yours can help with funding postgraduate study. If your employer needs more information, ask them to visit **www.lsbu.ac.uk/sponsoredstudy**.

Education trusts and charities

Some trusts and charities contribute to the costs of postgraduate study. You should generally apply for funding a year before your course starts.

Financial support Disabled Students' Allowance

Disabled Students' Allowances (DSAs) can help you pay the extra costs you may have because of your disability. The support you receive depends on your individual needs and not on income, and DSAs don't have to be repaid. As a higher education student living in England, you can apply for DSAs if you have a disability, for example:

- long-term health condition
- mental health condition
- specific learning difficulty such as dyslexia

Students with children

If you have children, you may be eligible for extra help from two main sources – your local authority and HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC).

Childcare Grant

The Childcare Grant is available to full-time students in low-income households. To qualify, you must have a dependent child or children in registered or approved childcare. On qualifying, you can receive up to 85 per cent of your actual childcare costs. Find out more at www.gov.uk/childcare-grant.

Parents' Learning Allowance

The Parents' Learning Allowance (PLA) is available to full-time students receiving the Childcare Grant. It's also available to other full-time students from low-income backgrounds with children.

The allowance helps you pay course-related costs such as books, materials and travel. You don't need to repay this help. Find out more at www.gov.uk/parents-learning-allowance.

Tax credits

If you have dependent children, you may also be entitled to claim Child Tax Credit from HMRC. The amount you receive will depend on your circumstances and income.

You may also be able to claim Working Tax Credit. However, if you get the childcare element of Working Tax Credit you won't be able to claim the Childcare Grant as well. Find out more at www.gov.uk/browse/benefits/tax-credits.

Students with adult dependants

If you are a full-time student with an adult who depends on you financially, you could be entitled to the Adult Dependants' Grant, which you don't have to repay.

An adult dependant can include a partner (of either sex) or another adult, usually a member of your family who depends on you financially. However, you can't count your grown-up children as adult dependants. How much you will get will depend on your income and the income of your adult dependants. Students from the Armed Forces

LSBU is an approved learning provider for the Enhanced Learning Credits Scheme, the Ministry of Defence's initiative to support lifelong learning. Financial support is available through this scheme to members of the armed forces. www.enhancedlearningcredits.com

Financial Support Fund

You can apply to our Financial Support Fund if you're a fully enrolled student who started your course with appropriate financial support arrangements in place. This is a discretionary fund and is in place to assist students who have found themselves facing shortterm financial difficulties. This fund cannot be used as a means to cover tuition fee costs.

Facilities

We have equipped our laboratories to prepare you for the workplace and reflect the environments you'll find there. Specialist facilities include biomechanics, physiology and gait analysis labs in our Human Performance area, where we assist Olympic-level as well as developing athletes. For psychology research we operate a simulated bar laboratory which enables researchers to examine the effects of environmental cues on drinking behaviour, as well as biopsychological recording equipment and an observation room with a two-way mirror.

Careers

Graduates from the School go into a wide range of roles. They become scientists in small companies, public institutions or multinational corporations and in the fields of bioscience, healthcare, public health, commercial analysis and food production. They go into sports nutrition, health promotion and education, research and teaching.

Psychology graduates go on to careers in clinical, forensic and counselling psychology, teaching, the probation and court services, and human resources and business.

Genevieve Waterhouse, Research degree

At LSBU, we're always keen to see our students add to their research and their educational experience by undertaking related work placements that can help them put their studies into context, or help them gain practical insight into the research questions they are asking.

PhD student Genevieve Waterhouse recently completed a three-month stint with Parliamentary Office of Science and Technology, supported by the British Psychological Society.

Together, Genevieve and her research partner Dr Sarah Bunn set out to explore how domestic abuse is currently being policed, with a view to identifying what works best in practice. For Genevieve herself, it's been a valuable learning experience. "Part of what makes this fellowship scheme so challenging and exciting is that you're operating outside your usual area of focus."

"My PhD is about supporting child witnesses, so this was essentially a new area for me. It's expanded my horizons, and given me more confidence in my own research skills. It's also been brilliant to find out more about how we as scientists interact with Parliament, and the role of research in influencing policy making in the real world." Entry requirements

This is a well-established route to a professional career in counselling 2:2 UK Honours degree or in addictions. Completing the course, which is accredited by the international equivalent: or Federation of Drug & Alcohol Professionals, will enable students demonstrable ability to work to work towards becoming fully accredited addiction counsellors.

> Applicants will normally have a professional, employment or voluntary work interest in addiction, and won't necessarily be a graduate.

> On the course, you'll explore the psychological basis of addiction counselling strategies, while gaining the ability to assess psychological models of these approaches.

In year one, you'll carry out work experience in a setting related to addiction. In year two, your counselling placement will equal 100 hours supervised practice. In your final year, you'll undertake a supervised, professionally oriented empirical research dissertation. Throughout, you'll study the psychology of addiction in depth. You'll embrace the main theories of addictive behaviours' development, alongside principal approaches to counselling in relation to the treatment of addictive disorders.

We've developed close links with leading treatment providers, for example, drug and alcohol teams in the public and charitable sectors, and residential and day care treatment providers in the private sector. This means our students are normally able to secure placements during the course and employment afterwards.

Graduating with an internationally recognised qualification, you'll be ready to take on demanding roles in wide-ranging food control activities in the private and public sectors.

Experts by experience (sometimes referred to as service users) will be heavily involved in the delivery of the course, and the design of the overall course structure. Jacqui Dillon (Chair of the Hearing Voices Network) will be a consultant throughout the design and implementation of this unique programme.

You'll develop expertise in the psychology of mental health and its related area of clinical psychology. This will include conceptual and political issues relating to social inequalities and psychosocial and community approaches to understanding the origins of mental distress.

All students complete a clinically relevant placement. For example, in 2016, 10 new placements were sourced including opportunities to work at the South London and Maudsley (SLaM) NHS Foundation Trust, as an honorary assistant psychologist.

MSc

The MSc in Psychology is a conversion course for individuals already possessing an undergraduate degree in a field other than Psychology but who wish to develop a professional career in Psychology.

By providing the requisite knowledge and skills for postgraduate education and training, this conversion course is the key gateway to a career in clinical, counselling, forensic, health, educational, occupational or other areas of Psychology (further training will be required to pursue these careers).

Psychology is an exceptionally versatile area because it offers understanding of many aspects of human behaviour, applicable to many sectors of society, such as education, health, business and social welfare. The course is among the first in the UK to teach the core curriculum in an integrated fashion, which brings together different approaches to psychology within each module and thereby provides a deeper and richer understanding of human behaviour. The Division of Psychology supports students to engage in work placements to boost their skills and knowledge base for future employment or training.

Having the knowledge this course provides about the processes that support and influence learning, memory, social interactions, feelings, thinking and communication, combined with the development of skills in critical thinking and research, will put you in an excellent position for further postgraduate training or future employment.

Research can be undertaken in any of our three divisions (Food Sciences, Human Sciences, Psychology) and is largely interdisciplinary and collaborative, with strong national and international links. Students may also join any of the research groups and centres in the School, where participation from doctoral students is strongly encouraged. We have a strong record of research in addiction psychology, ageing and exercise science, lived experiences of mental health, food safety, control and sustainability, sport psychology, musculoskeletal science, nutrition and physiology, biomechanics and back pain, and food preservation.

A research degree equips you with many transferable skills. The selfdiscipline, the demand for analytical thinking, and the ability to critique the work of others, all constitute a unique training for almost any kind of career. Doctoral students are often sponsored to attend national and international conferences, where you will be able to meet leading scientists in your field and present your research findings.

Elephant Studios

Our new multi-million pound media centre – Elephant Studios at LSBU – represents an investment by the University to create an industry-ready media facility that will ensure that graduates have the best possible experience and employment outcomes in a fast-changing digital media landscape.

It includes studio and production spaces with lighting rigs and green screen, ARRI cameras, a Dolby Atmos sound recording studio, 11 editing suites for post-production work in film, sound and journalism including high-end grading suites, a fully equipped radio studio, a screening room, a fully equipped newsroom and a dedicated print room.

An integral part of the studios, the dedicated newsroom is the home of 'Journalism.London' and the London base of the Global Campus Network. It is fitted with 42" displays, an audio mixer, 8 line inputs and 80 channel mix, News Synergy Workstation and 15" MacBooks – all for student use. Aiana Lacob relished the opportunity to work in a real news environment before graduating. "Being located in the middle of London also helped, as it made filming packages more convenient as well as making it easier to bring experts into the newsroom for interviews. [Elephant Studios] gave me a good idea of what to expect, and helped me develop my journalistic skills in a safe environment."

The Editing and Grading suites are acoustically treated and ideal for use in editing video and audio, and recording quick sound files. They also have neutral wall colours and lighting to provide optimal conditions for the colourist. The premium grading suite includes a Dolby calibrated screen to ensure ideal conditions.

MRes

The School of Arts and Creative Industries has a major commitment to scholarship and research. We recognise its significance in underpinning course provision, particularly at postgraduate level, and in developing enterprise and knowledge transfer with the media, arts and creative sectors.

We offer MRes supervision in a range of subject areas, methodologies and theoretical approaches, including practice-based research.

We welcome proposals in all areas of research relevant to the School. An MRes or Masters in Research is distinct from a taught Masters in that you'll be working and assessed solely on an extended dissertation or creative project relevant to your field of interest, rather than modulebased coursework. During your MRes you'll be supported by your supervisor to develop key research and analytical skills, enabling you to refine and answer your research question.

All research students are enrolled in the LSBU's postgraduate Key Skills programme. In addition, you can undertake research methods training from relevant MA and MSc courses, as well as taking part in specialist events and activities, which ensure an inclusive and thriving research culture.

Creative Performance Practice

MA

This innovative MA programme combines a range of diverse approaches to making performance, drawing on devising, physical theatre, directing, socially engaged practice, solo work and live art.

The MA will be delivered in partnership with the Lyric Hammersmith and other major London cultural institutions. The Lyric, one of the UK's biggest producing theatres, will offer intensive low-residency programmes of work at their impressive facilities.

The course is offered through two main pathways: the intensive graduate company working over the course of one year; or a low-residency model. The low-residency model is unique in the country and particularly attractive if you wish to further your studies and enhance your networking and career opportunities, but cannot commit to a traditional full-time offering. The graduate company brings together an ensemble of experienced performer/ practitioners to work intensively over the year on a series of live performance briefs. Both pathways will enable you to develop a strong network of professional contacts and a robust portfolio of work at a professional level.

The course entails intensive practical modules, masterclasses and workshops led by industry professionals. The intensive residency weeks will be delivered by our industry partners. The course also includes theoretical and critical blended learning modules running throughout the year, which can be completed at a time to suit your particular needs.

Editing and Post Production (EPP)

The MA in Editing and Post Production (EPP) is designed for students who want to acquire new skills and enhance their experience while developing their professional prospects in the creative industries. It offers the opportunity to study part-time or full-time in our excellent purpose-built media facilities in The Elephant Studios at LSBU.

The teaching is delivered by academic staff and industry professionals and it emphasises professional collaborative workflows and the roles of all personnel in the Editing Department in the context of digital film production. Subjects covered include: working with digital cinema camera recording formats (for example, Arri's Log C format), colour grading, audio post production, VFX and delivery platforms.

A key aim of the course is to produce graduates who are able to not only replicate existing forms and practices, but who can innovate and lead as well. Assessment and teaching encourages students to engage flexibly with new kinds of challenges and working environments: to, in effect, adapt, experiment and think in new ways. The course is focused around creative projects and it offers deep exposure to the skills, knowledge and creativity required to get a foothold in the competitive world of FPP and the wider creative industries

Master of Architecture

If you've already completed a validated undergraduate degree in architecture, this course is your chance to further define and extend your interests in a demanding and interesting professional discipline. You'll consider and refine your own responses to the design and making of architecture on this strongly design-based course, which is underpinned by a firm base in history, theory, and technology.

We encourage debate around contemporary culture, the postmodern city, and the relationships between urban and landscape conditions. We do this via diverse, considered responses to the architectural design project, and critical research expressed through extended, structured writing. We're committed to working in a studio-oriented environment where we find the best medium for each student to exchange and develop their ideas in a critical and reflective environment.

Working in our sixth-floor studios with dramatic views over the City of London, you will be able to choose to work in one of three design studios, each with a specialist approach to architecture based on specific responses to contemporary issues in the city, and developing landscapes around cities.

There's also an emphasis on observing and generating alternative models for the city and we have built on this by including field trips to a range of destinations.

Finally, there is a strong emphasis on both design through making, and energy and resource efficiency in design; you'll have the opportunity to work in our new DARLAB, and the established CEREB resource.

Building Services Engineering MSc

Building services engineers turn buildings from empty shells into spaces fit for use. They work with architects and other design team members to get the size, shape and configuration of the building right. They determine strategies for designing energy-efficient buildings, making them sustainable in the long term.

Of all the disciplines in the built environment, the role of the building services engineer has the broadest reach and deepest impact, affecting virtually every aspect of building design. Construction and engineering activity is expected to accelerate in the UK, Europe and worldwide over the next 20 years and demand for building services engineers continues to outstrip supply. Many of the leaders in energy and building services engineering fields are LSBU graduates, providing guidance, placement and employment opportunities.

The course will help you develop an advanced understanding of the technological areas of building services and energy engineering. There's particular emphasis on those areas relevant to the interaction between the built and natural environments, modern industry and the analysis of developing technologies.

A PhD is highly valued by employers globally as it supports the development of high level analytical thinking, problem-solving and communication skills and gives evidence of the capability to do truly innovative research. The School of Business has a vibrant research degrees programme, for both part time and full time PhD students. We offer our PhD students a full integration into one of the five research groups of our London Centre for Business and Entrepreneurship Research so that they can learn from both highly experienced academics as well as their fellow PhD students and be fully immersed in the ongoing research in the school. This includes weekly research seminars during term time, extensive conference and training support, debates with international visiting scholars, as well was the opportunity to write and publish refereed journal articles together with their supervisors during their PhD study. This means our students come away with a wealth of transferable skills and tangible research outputs on top of the highly coveted PhD award.

The London Centre for Business and Entrepreneurship has strong research and impact cases in five applied research areas that are important for modern entrepreneurship and align with the challenges of contemporary management: the need to succeed in a globalised and intercultural environment; the influence of digital technologies on work processes, management and markets; the need for forecasting business and market developments; the need for ethical, sustainable and social entrepreneurs and leaders; and the ability to develop the right management skills to deliver on the first four objectives.

These key areas are brought together under the roof of the new London Centre for Business and Entrepreneurship Research in five distinctive groups which are truly interdisciplinary and comprise of members from each of the core disciplines in business research across the school. These groups are: Intercultural Management; Digital Economy; Economic and Financial Modelling; Business Ethics and Corporate Social Responsibility and Entrepreneurial Skills Development and Experiential Learning. This supports interdisciplinary research and at the same time provides in-depth subject expertise and offers an excellent research and study environment for our doctoral students who all become student members of one of the research groups. Currently, the School of Business has especially strong ties with SMEs and the public sector which is reflected in collaborations, impact cases and outputs of the centre members. This aligns well with the entrepreneurship focus of the School and the entire university as entrepreneurial skills are of increasing importance also in the public sector and indispensable for SMEs.

We have highly experienced PhD supervisors in the areas of our five research groups and in the field of SME and the public sector research, and our academics cover all core School of Business disciplines from finance, economics, human resources, organisational behaviour, marketing, entrepreneurship to governance and enterprise education.

Prospective PhD students should in the first instance contact one of the research group leads, the PGR lead or the Director of Research for an initial discussion of their research interests and to identify a suitable PhD topic. 

Breast Imaging

PgCert

This programme is designed to address the increasingly specialised needs of practitioners for education to underpin professional practice in breast diagnosis.

A major feature of this programme is the option for you to pursue specific knowledge and skills development in your area of practice through the use of work-based learning, for example, breast ultrasound and ultrasound-guided biopsy procedures.

The programme includes provision for developing a high standard of mammography skills. However, it also caters for those wishing to move into advanced and consultant practice to meet the evolving requirements of breast screening and diagnostic services.

This course and the modules listed within it form the franchised agreement between LSBU and the National Breast Screening Training Centre, King's College Hospital NHS Foundation Trust.

The course focuses on competency development and attainment within the breast imaging and breast care fields, adhering to the national standards of the NHS Breast Screening Programme, the Royal College of Radiologists, the Society and College of Radiographers and the Consortium for the Accreditation of Sonographic Education.

Diagnostic Imaging

This programme is designed to meet the CPPD requirements of healthcare professionals who utilise diagnostic imaging procedures in their practice.

This course focuses on the Department of Health's (DOH) four themes of: clinical/direct care and practice; leadership and collaborative practice; improving quality and developing practice; and developing self and others (DOH, 2010). Mental Health Nursing (Pre-registration)

This course equips you with the skills to work in a diverse range of mental health nursing roles across a range of settings, including the NHS and the private healthcare sector.

It includes developing expert assessment skills, knowledge and understanding of complex case work, multi-agency working, safeguarding, and leadership.

The programme will provide you with the skills to critically appraise the evidence base in an area of personal interest, relevant to your area of professional practice. You'll gain knowledge and understanding of a range of therapeutic interventions that promote mental health and well-being, and the rights of individuals and communities to gain access to good mental and physical health services without prejudice. These learnings can be applied to enhance care delivery and support best practice for health improvements to client populations across health and social care settings.

There are four specialist pathways to choose from, allowing you to tailor your learning to your organisational and employment demands: MSc Mental Health Practice (Autism and Intellectual Disability); MSc Mental Health Practice (Child and Adolescent Mental Health – CAMHS); MSc Mental Health Practice (Forensics); MSc Mental Health Practice (Mindfulness-based interventions).

This Masters course in nursing is aimed at qualified healthcare professionals who have post-qualifying experience. It will enable you to develop higher levels of understanding and the ability to manage the complex care needs of patients within a constantly evolving and changing healthcare environment.

The course employs a flexible approach to module selection and completion that allows you to tailor your studies to fit with work and personal commitments, and to enhance and support your chosen career pathway. The course team acknowledges that, in most cases, practitioners will be engaged in full-time work. Changing demographics, treatments, technology and expectations are all powerfully influencing the development of Older People's Care as a specialty. This course sees the care of older people as collaborative and interdisciplinary with a positive view towards the possibilities of longer, healthier lives and the need to address those matters of ill health that can threaten the quality of later life.

Saint Francis Hospice in collaboration with LSBU has developed this innovative interdisciplinary postgraduate course in palliative and end of life care. The course is designed to develop academic and clinical leaders who embody the values, principles and philosophy of palliative care for the future progression of contemporary healthcare in England and internationally.

This course promotes innovation through interdisciplinary learning, translation of theory into practice and enhancement of palliative care for patients, their families, the wider healthcare team and society.

The aim of this course is to advance and build upon existing knowledge, skills, professional values and attitudes in order to promote competence in caring for people with life-limiting illness in a range of healthcare settings. It enables health and social care professionals to enhance care provided to patients and families facing physical, psychosocial and spiritual issues associated with life-limiting illness. The underpinning philosophy of this course is based on enabling individuals to appraise current national and international research and evidence-based interventions to inform practice and service development.

The course reflects the multi-professional nature of palliative care, and health and social care professionals are given the opportunity to learn together; therefore, student learning is facilitated by a multiprofessional teaching team using a blended learning approach with a particular emphasis on linking theory to practice.

Perinatal Mental Health

Physiotherapy (Pre-registration)

MSc

This course provides an accelerated two-year route to qualification in physiotherapy for graduates with a first degree in a related field. Students will develop knowledge and skills to become an effective and resourceful physiotherapist, able to work within a rapidly changing healthcare environment.

Physiotherapists play an increasingly key role in enabling people to improve their health, well-being and quality of life by helping patients to prevent and manage a wide range of health conditions and presentations. Physiotherapists use a broad range of treatment approaches, focusing on restoring movement and function, often following illness or injury.

Our course has strong links with physiotherapists working in the public health and social care sector as well as private and social enterprise settings across Greater London. We utilise the expertise of clinicians to contribute to the course design, teaching sessions and provision of practice placements.

The MSc in Physiotherapy (pre-registration) is a clinically-orientated study programme. Practice-based learning will be central to the course delivery. Students will spend at least 1,000 hours in clinical practice during the course. Practice placements are skills based to facilitate the transfer of skills across clinical areas. The range of practice settings/ placements covered will offer students the opportunity to experience a wide variety of healthcare settings.

Postgraduate research skills will be developed with a 20-credit research methods module and a 60-credit dissertation.

On graduation, you'll be eligible to apply for registration with the HCPC as a physiotherapist, and as a member of the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy.

Doctorate in Health

Public Health and Health Promotion

The academic and applied focus of this course will enable you to become a graduate who asks questions and knows how to answer them using critical thinking and reflective practice.

Central to this course is our commitment to the process of enabling people and communities to increase control over their health and well-being. This approach will provide you with the tools and knowledge to tackle inequalities in health and work towards combating social exclusion. It draws upon the multi-disciplinary, multi-professional context of public health and engages with the interface between theory and practice.

The course provides an opportunity to examine concepts of public health and health promotion in a social context, but from a sound foundation of epidemiology and using the core principles of health protection. You'll also be offered the opportunity to see politics and social policy in action with guided visits to Parliament, and to explore the public health history of central London on guided public health walking tours.

We are currently in a pilot phase of working with local public health departments who offer public health career mentoring and dissertation research opportunities.

Radiographic Reporting

This programme has significant work-based elements, therefore it's essential you have effective support and mentorship in your base department. The work-based learning component is well-structured and monitored by us through clinical visits.

A PhD is an original contribution to knowledge. A research degree is different from a taught course. Research students are expected to selfdirect their learning with support from a supervisory team.

The School of Health and Social Care runs a monthly doctoral support programme where you can meet students at different points in their doctoral studies and benefit from peer feedback and sessions to support your learning. There are also development sessions organised by the Central Research Support Department for LSBU's research students and a lively annual summer school.

A member of staff, expert in the chosen field, is directly responsible for guiding and supporting your research programme. As a research student you'll become part of our thriving academic community.

"Social workers work with individuals and families to help improve outcomes in their lives. This may be helping to protect vulnerable people from harm or abuse or supporting people to live independently. Social workers support people, act as advocates and direct people to the services they may require. Social workers often work in multidisciplinary teams alongside health and education professionals." (British Association of Social Workers)

Through this course you'll develop into a critically reflective practitioner ready to meet the needs of service users, carers and communities in the context of a complex and changing society. On successful completion of the course you will be eligible to register as a social worker with the HCPC (or any successive social work regulatory body in place when you qualify). You will be qualified, equipped and prepared to work across a range of settings and with service users with a range of needs in both children's and adults' services.

A key focus for this course is the involvement of service users and social work practitioners in the development, delivery and assessment of the course in different, often innovative, ways. You will also be taught by academic staff who are all qualified and registered social workers and able to help you make connections between theory and practice. We work with many practice organisations across all sectors and you will undertake two fully supported placements in different settings.

You can opt for the MA Social Work employment-based route if you have an employer who will sponsor you on the course. There is no difference in teaching or structure but you can choose to extend the course to three years with the dissertation being done in the final year.

Therapeutic Radiography (Pre-registration)

PgDip/Top-up to MSc/MSc

Therapeutic radiographers are at the forefront of cancer care, and they play a vital role in the delivery of radiotherapy services. They treat patients with cancer using advancing technologies that administers ionising radiation, ensuring that treatment planning and delivery is achieved with absolute precision.

Therapeutic radiographers work closely with professionals from other disciplines. They are involved in the care and support of the cancer patient and their families from the initial referral clinic stage, through planning and delivery of the treatment, and eventually post-treatment review and follow-up stages.

Our programme, aimed at graduates with level 6 qualifications, will develop your enquiring, reflective and innovative approach to therapeutic radiography within the context of rapid changes in the health service.

Clinical placements are an essential part (50 per cent) of the course. Develop a critical understanding of autism, relevant legislation, education policy and interventions.

This qualification is designed for people with an interest in autism and practitioners in the field of education, who have experience of working with learners with autism across the age range (in keeping with the o-25 framework in the Children and Families Act 2014).

The course content is informed by the experiences and voices of those with autism and our approach is underpinned by the inclusive principle "nothing about us without us".

You'll apply theory to practice – and in so doing you'll have the opportunity to reflect on inclusive practices and their efficacy in assisting diverse learners with autism to be successful in education. This course will develop your ability to analyse critically and build upon your own attitudes, professional experience and practice including the promotion of social justice, inclusion, and equity as a policy and a practice.

Civil Litigation and Dispute Resolution

The LLM Civil Litigation and Dispute Resolution offers you the opportunity to gain a recognised legal professional qualification as a Graduate or Associate Member of the Chartered Institute of Legal Executives (CILEx), and build valuable professional experience working as a volunteer in our Legal Advice Clinic.

Graduate Members of CILEx are entitled to become Fellows of CILEx after three years of legal practice. Fellows of CILEx are fully qualified legal professionals with the same professional privileges and responsibilities as solicitors, but they are qualified to work within one specified legal practice area only. The cost of the LLM is considerably less than the Bar Professional Training Course or the Legal Practice Course. Qualification with CILEx does not require a pupillage or training contract, just the three years' qualifying legal employment.

You'll study the law, procedure and theory of civil litigation and related dispute resolution processes while also gaining practical legal experience and developing your professional skills. Crime and Litigation

This is for you if you're a recent graduate, or already working within the criminal justice field. It's a chance to build your academic and practical knowledge of the litigation process. It's also relevant to human rights workers and policy agents working in the UK or abroad.

On the course, you'll gain demonstrable understanding of the key principles that ground the UK criminal justice system, its issues, approaches and topical debates. You'll do this through critical and comparative studies of justice and the criminal litigation process.

There's an emphasis on human rights and justice issues, with insights into current legal and criminal justice practice issues from leading practitioners. We enjoy strong links with the legal profession, having developed a contact network of leading criminal law practitioners. Recent guest lecturers include: Imran Khan, one of the best-known human rights and criminal lawyers in the UK, who represented the parents of Stephen Lawrence; Solicitor, Vera Baird QC; and Roger Smith, former director of human rights group Justice.

On completing the course, you'll have acquired an in-depth, systematic understanding of criminal litigation and criminal justice and be able to work at the cutting edge of practice and research.

Criminology and Social Research Methods

MSc

This course is ideal for those engaged in criminal justice policy analysis and development or similar work in allied fields. Our focus is on contemporary substantive issues in criminology and criminal justice, and criminological research methods.

You'll develop a theoretical, policy and technical understanding of key issues within criminology, criminal justice and research methods. More specifically, you'll form an advanced understanding of the complex nature of crime, harm and victimisation. In addition, you'll gain an appreciation of the role of the state/criminal justice system in regulating human behaviour, deviance and crime.

You'll leave ready to design and implement social science research using a broad range of methodologies, and consider research ethics, analysing and presenting the subsequent material.

Combining criminology and research methods will enable you to think logically and in an informed way about criminological issues. You're also encouraged to undertake voluntary work in a variety of criminal justicerelated agencies.

The Crime and Justice Research Group (CJRG) is an inter-disciplinary, cross-School, collaboration with a focus on research aligned to its core theme, that is, criminalisation and marginalisation. The CJRG aims to deliver applied research that makes a real-life difference to criminalised/marginalised groups and/or individuals, particularly those who are already vulnerable or experiencing inequality. The Group has established links with a range of government agencies, such as the Ministry of Justice, and the Youth Justice Board, as well as other organisations, such as Prison Advice and Care Trust; Prison Education Trust/Learning Together; and the PROMISE (Promoting Refugee Integration Support through youth engagement) Project.

Development and Urbanisation

MSc

This programme responds to the growing demands made on the humanitarian and development sectors by intensive urbanisation. This course has been established by the research and consultancy group on International Development, Emergencies and Refugees (IDEARS). If you wish to pursue a career with governments, non-governmental organisations, international agencies, public and private organisations and enterprises, this course is for you.

Ours is a rapidly urbanising world: by 2010 over half the world's population lived in cities. Urbanisation is fastest in the developing world, where both primary and secondary cities are rapidly expanding. It is predicted that by 2020 more Africans will live in urban than in rural areas, and in China, by 2023. Except in countries emerging from war, urbanisation is closely linked to economic growth, although urban poverty levels continue to rise.

This rapid growth, particularly in the light of its links to the flight from rural poverty and the development of a massive informal sector, has posed immense challenges to all urban systems. In many Asian, Latin American and African cities 30-70% of the population lives in slums and more than 90% of new jobs are in the informal sector. In transition countries, already highly urbanised, the changing political and economic framework has led to widespread poverty. Everywhere, urban roads, utilities, education and health services, and governance processes are heavily strained. While cities experience high levels of investment, it is often uneven.

MSc

The MSc Development Studies course is interdisciplinary and innovative. It is designed for those who wish to pursue careers with governments, non-governmental organisations, international agencies, public and private organisations and enterprises. It provides a thorough grounding in the development field, and its emphasis on research enables students to specialise in their particular areas of interest.

Through the use of case studies you'll analyse a range of issues, crucial for development policy and practice, such as:

Education – Autism

This course focuses on learning from the authentic voices of people with personal experience of autism and the expectation that students will engage critically with received wisdom about autism. You'll gain a practice focused higher degree and to extend your understanding of autism in education in its broadest sense.

Although mainly aimed at practising teachers across the age range of pre-school to adults, we welcome applications from other suitably qualified education professionals and interested parties (e.g. mentors, other support professionals, school governors, parents and volunteers).

Working with a diverse group of peers and tutors (including people who identify as being on the autism spectrum) from a range of educational backgrounds, you'll find learning relevant to all kinds of settings. Our Critical Autism /Disability Studies Research Group (which incorporates the Participatory Autism Research Collective) provides opportunities to work with like-minded, research-active colleagues, including autistic researchers who have unique insider perspective, within a supportive community.

One of our programme's distinctive features is that educational settings provide the context of most students' study. Access to an educational setting in a professional or voluntary capacity is therefore a requirement of the course.

The programme complements and supports all current career and professional development initiatives and frameworks. This extends to providing evidence for the professional standards for teachers and professional development requirements for university mentors of autistic students.

Education – Special Educational Needs and Disability

MA

MA Education (Special Educational Needs and Disability) provides an in-depth understanding of inclusive practice in education across the age range from pre-school to higher education, relevant in a wide range of settings.

You'll explore the diverse needs of learners identified with special educational needs and disability (SEND), alongside best practice to support inclusive learning and achievement. In addition, we'll encourage you to critically engage with relevant theory and legislation, contextualised and applied in practice. The course is informed by the experiences of disabled people and based on the principle of 'nothing about us without us'.

You'll develop your particular interest into a dissertation, with opportunities to disseminate your findings to the workplace. Our Centre for Educational Research has a number of ongoing disability-focused research projects and hosts the Disability Equality Research Network.

Taking place at LSBU and in SEND partners' schools, the course is delivered by academics and experts from the sector. You'll be taught by Prof. Nicola Martin who has substantial experience in the field of autism, including working with Prof. Simon Baron-Cohen on the Cambridge University Autism Project. Recent guest lecturers include disabled academics and parents of pupils who've experienced special education. You can choose to take the recognised National Award for SEN Coordination.

Housing Studies

MA / PgDip / PgCert

This will be ideal for you if you're at officer or middle management level in housing and related professions, keen to consolidate your experience with structured learning. It could help you advance your career, taking on a more strategic policy and management role.

Good quality housing is one of the most basic necessities in producing thriving communities, so the job market offers plenty of opportunities to graduates.

The learning style is designed to provide support through lectures, workshops and speakers from practice, as well as through regular process meetings between students and tutors. All modules are assessed by coursework rather than exam.

The course includes a one-week residential European field study, the cost of which is included in the tuition fees. Students currently undertake a comparative study in housing policy of the UK and the Netherlands, and visit Amsterdam.

This will appeal to those interested in the increasing trend in international human rights law to criminalise and prosecute mass human rights atrocities.

You'll cover international criminal law's concepts and enforcement, focusing on international crimes falling under the jurisdiction of international criminal courts and tribunals. These include genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and aggression.

It will mean exploring the contours of the duty to prosecute those who commit international crimes, placing emphasis on applying domestic and international law to the question of jurisdiction over international criminal activities. In addition, you'll consider the procedural aspects of international cooperation in criminal matters, particularly extradition and problems associated with obtaining evidence from abroad.

You'll gain in-depth knowledge of international criminal law and procedure, international human rights law and international humanitarian law. What's more, you'll possess the skills and knowledge to practise international criminal law before international tribunals or national courts.

A number of visiting professors and lecturers teach on the course, all leading practitioners with national reputations in international criminal law and human rights.

Cities and especially global(ising) cities are set to see their economic, cultural and environmental roles gain greater significance in the next decade or so. Many forums and coalitions recognise the importance of understanding, researching, managing, planning and coordinating the continued growth of cities worldwide.

London is already home to over 8 million people. Can it continue to provide a ready stream of quality housing for its inhabitants? To what extent do London's regenerated spaces meet the needs of London's businesses and population? Refugee Studies

MSc

This masters will develop your critical engagement with the theories and practices of forced migration and development studies. In-depth knowledge of both disciplines is critical to understand and explain the causes and consequences of forced migration.

Taught by internationally recognised members of staff with a range of innovative research experiences, the course is interdisciplinary. It requires the use of theoretical and methodological insights, knowledge and perspectives of different disciplines. This provides opportunities for in-depth understanding and explanation of the problem of Forced Migration and its interface with other social science disciplines, such as development studies, law, political science and psychology.

Starting in both in September and January, this programme aims to develop your critical engagement with the theories and practices of forced migration and development studies. In-depth knowledge of both disciplines is critical to understanding and explaining the causes and consequences of forced migration, analysing, critiquing and evaluating host governments', United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees' (UNCHR) and NGOs' policies on protection, assistance, reception and settlement strategies, as well as the short and long-term responses of inter -governmental organisations, such as the World Bank and others.

Throughout the course, you'll also engage in volunteering. Students have volunteered in different organisations, including the UK Refugee Council, British Red Cross, UNHCR, Chance UK, Naz Project London and Eaves in South London. These organisations provide support, advice and advocacy to asylum-seekers, including women who've experienced violence, such as trafficking, prostitution, domestic and sexual violence.


The MA Urban Design and Planning course is fully accredited by the Royal Town Planning Institute (RTPI), and focuses on urban design as part of town planning and equips students with a comprehensive understanding of urban design, planning and development issues. The programme provides an inter-disciplinary approach to urban design, helping students to develop the knowledge and skills required to engage with the complex issues facing our cities and to increase their employability in the expanding profession of urban design and in the related fields of planning and development.

Through working at different scales of the city and engaging with theoretical debates, students will gain a critical understanding of the characteristics of good places and will be equipped to make a decisive contribution to shaping those places in the decades ahead.

Students will be engaged in project work on sites where there are current urban design and planning issues, and will debate these issues with staff and external guests; the programme also includes a compulsory one week residential European field study visit. In recent years students have visited Barcelona, Turin, Venice or Dortmund. The study visit costs are included in the tuition fee.

Apprenticeships and Employer-sponsored study

LSBU has been working with employers to meet their education and training needs since 1892 and today over a third of our students are sponsored by their employer to study with us. We are a vocational university first and foremost focused on providing the skills that employers need. We know how to train employees to help businesses grow. We focus on developing professional skills and are experts in providing relevant training for the modern market.

Higher and Degree Apprenticeships at LSBU

We're one of the first universities to offer apprenticeships, in response to demand from employers. We offer apprenticeship programmes across a wide range of sectors, representing hundreds of different job roles. Apprenticeships are a priority for the university and we'll be offering new apprenticeship standards as and when they are signed off by the government.

Our courses are already accredited and developed with industry, so apprenticeships are a natural progression. Furthermore, courses at LSBU are kept up to date by our staff, who maintain strong links with you, the employer, and professional bodies throughout.

What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a job that includes relevant training. It's a work-focused, government-approved, learning programme that provides employees with the technical knowledge, skills, and behaviours to be successful in their career and an asset to their employer. Apprenticeships are open to all ages, and can apply to new staff, as well as existing employees who would benefit from and have the desire to acquire new knowledge and skills.

Higher and Degree apprenticeships include qualifications at HNC, Degree and Masters Level covering levels 4 upwards. To become an apprentice you must be 16 or over, living in England and not in full-time education.

Typically apprentices attend university one day a week and many courses lead to professional accreditation. You will also need to complete a workbased competency assessment as part of the apprenticeship.

Apprenticeships – benefits for employers

Apprenticeships help businesses to grow their own talent by developing a motivated, skilled and qualified workforce that meets their skills needs. Hiring new apprentices and sending existing staff on apprenticeships brings economic benefits to businesses from all sectors including SMEs, multinationals and the public sector. Higher and Degree apprenticeships offer businesses the opportunity to train their staff at undergraduate and postgraduate level at university.

Our dedicated Apprenticeships Team is staffed with apprenticeship experts that are here to support organisations throughout the apprenticeship journey, from recruitment to completion.

FEES AND FUNDING

Apprenticeships

The benefits of apprenticeships include costeffectiveness, as the training costs of apprentices are wholly or partly met via the apprenticeship levy. At the time of writing, levy-paying companies could have 100% of the tuition fees up to the funding cap pay via their levy contribution. Once this levy contribution is exhausted, the government will paid 90% of training costs up to the levy cap. For non-levy payers, the government will pay 90% of the training costs up to the funding cap and the employer will pay the outstanding 10%. Further incentives for small businesses and apprentices aged 16-18 years may be available.

Employer-sponsored students

Normally tuition fees are paid by the employer. However, the learner will remain personally responsible for payment of fees and charges, even where there is an arrangement for the university to receive payment on your behalf from a sponsor or other third party.

We'll help you undertake a training needs analysis, maximise your levy spend, navigate the Digital Apprenticeship Service, understand the changing world of apprenticeships and provide the support that you and your apprentice needs to prepare for the end point assessment.

In addition, the LSBU Apprenticeships Team can support employers with apprentice recruitment, offer a dedicated account manager and enable advanced entry for staff with relevant experience or additional qualifications.

- 87% of employers said they were satisfied with the apprenticeship programme, 76% say that productivity has improved and 75% reported that apprenticeships improved the quality of their product or service.
- After finishing, 7 in 10 apprentices (77%) stay with the same employer.

Apprenticeships – benefits for apprentices

Apprenticeships enable people of all ages and both school leavers and those already in employment to earn while they learn. Higher and Degree apprenticeships go up to Masters level (and in time will go up to PhD level). Higher and Degree apprenticeships allow individuals who are starting a new career, or those who are already employed, to study for a qualification while working. The apprentice does not have to pay for the university course – it is paid by their employer and the UK government. And at the end of the course you could have a Higher/Bachelor's or Master's degree.

Employer-sponsored study

With flexibility a significant draw, sponsored students take undergraduate and postgraduate programmes, either part-time or full-time.

If you cannot find an apprenticeship standard to meet your training needs then LSBU can still train staff who are in employment. In fact LSBU has one of the highest numbers of employers-sponsored students of any university.

We have a proven track record of helping businesses train their employees and our flexible approach ensures that what we deliver suits workplace requirements. Our courses are kept right up to date by highly qualified staff, who maintain strong links with employers, professional bodies and public and private sector enterprises.

With more than 1,000 industry partners across all sectors, employer-sponsored students make up a significant proportion of LSBU's students.

Information for international applicants

We welcome applicants from all over the world to LSBU. That's why we've committed more than £1 million in financial support to help well-qualified students from outside the EU meet the cost of their studies.

Through our International Scholarship programme, we offer scholarships of £1,000 to well-qualified international students.

Our support services will help you settle in quickly at LSBU. We have a dedicated Immigration and International Student Advice team who can provide you with advice and support throughout your time with us. English language requirement

If English isn't your first language, you'll need to achieve a certain level before starting your course, through a recognised English language qualification. The minimum requirement for most of our postgraduate courses is an International English Language Testing System (IELTS) score of 6.5 (with at least 5.5 in each skill area).

Visas and entry information

Most students from outside the European Economic Area will need a student visa to study in the UK. The main visa route for students who wish to study in the UK is the Tier 4 (General) student visa. LSBU holds a Tier 4 licence and can sponsor overseas students with the relevant qualifications to study here under the Tier 4 (General) category. 
