

Continuing your studies

You must achieve a minimum average of 60% overall and passes in all ten academic modules in the first year of the programme, as well as grade C with a minimum of grade D in each component in the English Language and Study Skills module, in order to progress to Year 2 of your study plan. Transferring to Master of Engineering

All students will automatically be enrolled on the BEng (Hons) degree programme. The option to transfer between BEng and MEng or to include a sandwich year will be possible subject to UKVI regulations. Staff within the University will guide you through the transfer of programmes.

Industrial placements

You may have the opportunity to undertake a 12-month work experience placement between Year 2 and the final year of your degree. This is an amazing opportunity to gain real world engineering experience and improve your technical and professional skills. The placement is optional for all degrees. You will be required to find your own placement, however most Schools have a placement office to support and assist you through the process.

Please note you may need to apply for another visa if you wish to undertake a placement or transfer to the MEng.



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


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
