
Each year, we welcome many hundreds of international students from over 100 nations to the University, who join us to study at one of our UK campuses or partner institutions overseas.

Our heritage



A lot has changed, but you'll find our foundation remains: we continue to invest in our students and campuses to provide you with the best support, facilities and inspiration, in order to help you achieve your goals.











THE EARLY YEARS (1827-1899)

The roots of the University lie in the 19th century growth of Mechanics Institutes, which provided vocational and general education for working men. Following its formation in 1827, the institution grew and strengthened in the decades that followed, influenced heavily by the Industrial Revolution.

EARLY 20TH CENTURY (1900-1944)

An educational foundation had firmly been established with the Wolverhampton Technical College being formed by 1915, as well as the Municipal School of Arts, later to become the Wolverhampton College of Art. In 1932, at the iconic Marble building in Wulfruna Street, the foundation stone was laid by HRH Prince George forming the base for the University's presence in Wolverhampton city centre to the present day.

THE POST-WAR YEARS (1945-1968)

The post-war 'boom' in education led to a growing demand for a variety of subject areas. By 1966, with student numbers at c.7,000, the College began to provide Bachelor's degrees with options in English, Geography, History, Music, Economics and Computer Technology and held its first ever degree ceremony.

WOLVERHAMPTON POLYTECHNIC (1969-1991)

On 1 September 1969, the College was officially designated a Polytechnic. The 1970s saw Wolverhampton develop into a truly international community with students from Iran, Malaysia, and Nigeria, and the delivery of Wolverhampton courses internationally beginning to flourish. By the 1980s, nurse education was brought into higher education institutions from hospitals, mainly in polytechnics, leading to the creation of the School of Nursing and Midwifery at Walsall Campus.

THE UNIVERSITY OF WOLVERHAMPTON (1992-PRESENT)

In 1992, Wolverhampton Polytechnic was granted university status and became the University of Wolverhampton with direct degree awarding powers. Today, we continue to invest in our students, staff, alumni and in the local and international community with over 4,000 students graduating each year.

How to get to us

Wherever you're travelling from, getting to us here in Wolverhampton is simple thanks to our central UK location.

BY PLANE

Birmingham International Airport is just 30 minutes away by train with direct routes from countries including China, India, the USA and much of Europe.

BY TRAIN

Wolverhampton City Campus is just 5 minutes' walk from the West Coast mainline station, with frequent and direct trains from and to Birmingham (18 minutes), Manchester (just over 1 hour) and London (under 2 hours).

BY CAR

The city is close to the M54, M5 and M6 motorways, so you can easily get to us by car or by coach.

When you want to explore the rest of the UK, Wolverhampton's proximity to these local, national and international transport links makes getting around easy.

The city is also a bus and metro hub, making the rest of the West Midlands easily accessible.

City

With a history going back to the early 19th century, City Campus is right in the centre of Wolverhampton and could be where you start your own journey.

Intensive English Pre-sessional preparation courses

Students are required to hold an IELTS score of 6.0 overall with 5.5 in each component in order to enter our undergraduate and postgraduate programmes directly. However, if you do not hold this score, do not worry! One of our intensive English courses will help you meet the requirements.

In these classes, you will practise writing, reading, grammar, listening, and formal and informal speaking. You will also find out about British culture and society.

The University works with an extensive network of transnational education (TNE) partners around the world that either:



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Your tuition fee varies according to your chosen course, your level of study, your chosen mode of study and whether you are eligible to pay European Union (EU) or international fees (which depends on your nationality and residency over the past three years).

Money Matters

We believe that the overall Wolverhampton experience offers excellent value for money and is a sensible investment in your future.

Cost of living in Wolverhampton is recognised as being good value compared to other cities in the UK, particularly London – according to numbeo. com consumer prices in Wolverhampton are 20% lower, eating out is 30% less expensive, and rents are up to 72.87% lower!

It's estimated that a single student living in Wolverhampton will need approximately £1,015 a month to meet basic living expenses such as accommodation costs, food, books and equipment, and other necessities. This is in line with the Home Office recommended figures for living outside London. This figure is given as a guide only.

WHERE TO BUY FOOD

Wolverhampton has a variety of major supermarkets including ASDA, Sainsbury's and Tesco, cheaper supermarkets including Lidl and Aldi, and premium supermarkets such as Waitrose and Marks & Spencer. British shops and larger supermarkets stock a wide range of products including foods imported from other countries and foods meeting religious requirements, such as Halal. There are also many local ethnic stores where you will be able to find the foods you are used to eating at home.

Food prices are very different depending on where you shop and what products you buy. Supermarkets often have 'own label' brands which are cheaper than more recognised brands. You could also explore local markets or bulk buying.

The shopping list below gives an approximate idea of the cost of basic products in the UK from a supermarket. Another easy way to understand whether you have budgeted enough is to visit: https://international.studentcalculator.org

FOOD COSTS: £30 - £35 (average cost of weekly shop purchasing supermarket's own brand).

ACCOMMODATION COSTS:

£4,900 - £8,300 per year depending on the type of accommodation.

OTHER COSTS: To cover items such as books, clothing, entertainment, laundrette and dry-cleaning, personal hygiene items and household articles, you will need approximately £340 for the year.

The following example helps to illustrate the breakdown of costs.

Let's say your course fee is £12,000 and you've paid £3,000 in advance. For living costs you'll need to show £9,135 (£1,015 x 9 months) but you've also paid £500 towards your University accommodation already.

So, for this example, the amount you'll need to show in your bank account is £17,635 – because

£9,000 + £9,135 - £500 = £17,635.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE:

Your statement of purpose must explain your reasons for joining the course. This can include why you are applying, why you have chosen the programme, and how it is related to your future career ambitions.



ENGLISH LANGUAGE: We require a certified English language test IELTS or in some instances, country specific English language exams can be accepted



REFERENCE: All references, academic or employer, need to be submitted on institutional letterhead to be valid

FINAL CERTIFICATE: If you are still finishing your current studies, we need to receive your final transcripts and certificates. When you receive these documents, please forward copies to us.



TB CERTIFICATE: If you are spending more than six months in the UK, and you're from one of the countries listed at: **www.gov.uk/tb-test-visa,** you'll need to take a tuberculosis (TB) test.



PASSPORT: A copy of the picture and data page of your passport.



BANK STATEMENT: Before international students are issued a CAS to make a visa application, we need to see proof of funds have been maintained for 28 days. This means that you will need to send bank statements to show that you have saved all unpaid tuition fees and living expenses in your bank account for 28 days.



PARENT'S BANK ACCOUNT: If using your parent's/legal guardian's account, you need to show evidence that you are related to them and that you have permission to use their money. This is usually by showing an original birth certificate and a signed letter confirming your parents are willing to sponsor you and that you are their son or daughter. Please note, an affidavit cannot be used to prove someone is your parent or legal guardian.
