Our student body is diverse. Of our 2014-I5 intake on full-time courses, 36% are from the UK, 35% are from Europe, and 29% are from the rest of the world and 45% are female. We have awarded Voices that Matter scholarships to students from the UK, Palestine, Israel, Gaza, the USA, Uganda and South Africa.

THE HISTORY OF METSCHOOL

Born in 2003

First 8-week course takes place in Clapham, London.

2005

Move into Ealing Studios. First unaccredited one-year course begins. Met Film acquires postproduction business.

2006

Met Film launches production business.

2007

25 students enroll on first BA course validated by then TVU (now known as University of West London).

2009

BA Practical Filmmaking launches with II9 enrolments. Meanwhile, Met Film Production's Little Ashes and French Film are released in the UK and other territories.

2010

Teddy Cherim and Kees van Nieuwkerk's graduation film Sterke Verhalen (Tall Stories), is released in 34 cities across Holland and Belgium. Met Film Production's The Infidel opens in over 40 territories.

2011

Egill Kristbjornsson's graduation film, Paper, premieres at Tribeca alongside Met Film Production's Donor Unknown, which is then released in cinemas in the UK.

2012

In Germany Met Film School Berlin opens at Havel Studios. Meanwhile, Met Film Production's Town of Runners, conceived and co-produced by graduate Dan Demissie opens in Tribeca and is released in cinemas in the UK by Dogwoof. Another Met Film School student, Perry Bhandal, sees his film, Interview with a Hitman, released by Kaleidoscope - a year after he pitched the idea at the school.

2013

Due to a growth in numbers over 2012 Met Film School Berlin moves to new premises at BUFA studios with increased facilities for students.

In the UK there are commercial releases for Project Wild Thing (graduate, David Bond), and in the UK and

Met Film School was founded in 2003. Since then the School has grown substantially and it now has extensive campuses in Ealing Studios London and BUFA Studios Berlin. Here are a few key moments in Met Film School's story...

Germany for Papadopoulos and Sons (graduate, Marcus Markou) and in France for White Lie (graduate, Nyima Cartier), and for Met Film Production films Village at the End of the World, and The Great Hip Hop Hoax. Also, Ross Domoney's graduation film, The High Price of Gold, wins top prize at the Thessaloniki Documentary Festival.

2014

Graduate Chika Anadu wins best feature film for B for Boy at the Africa Movie Academy Awards. BA graduate Assaf Machnes wins Best Short Film Awards at the Jerusalem Jewish Film Festival, Quinta Praia International Film Festival, Youki International Youth Film Festival, 20 MinMax Film Festival and the Sehsüchte International Film Festival. The film also gained a Special Mention Award at the Molodist Kiev International Film Festival and won the ARTE Award at the Munich Student Film Festival.

2015

Met Film School collaborates with YouTube to launch YouTube Space Berlin @ Met Film School, a large studio with production and training facilities for YouTube Creators and Met Film School Students. This is one of only six YouTube Creator Spaces worldwide and one of only 2 based within a film school globally.

Student films secure 52 festival screenings. 10 prizes are won by the school's graduates including; Che Grant for One Night Only, Jonathan Schey for I Wanna be Happy, Christina Hardinge for Another Green World, Guy Lubin for Bistro Caprice, Rhys Brisenden for Midnight Snack, Paloma Lommel for The Schoolboy and Raluca Ionescu for Half Tone.

In 2015

82% of graduates from the school's undergraduate courses are now working in the creative industries in permanent, contract or freelance positions'. 45% of its students are female. There are over 300 students studying full-time courses and over 700 students are enrolled on the School's short courses. Between them these students will make 800 short films, 3 feature films and 3 TV series over the year.

ABOUT MET FILM SCHOOL BERLIN

Met Film School opened its doors to budding filmmakers over ten years ago, and following its success the school decided to launch a second campus in Berlin – right at the heart of European independent filmmaking.

Met Film School Berlin embodies exactly the same ethos as the London School, offering an intensive practical filmmaking experience taught by industry professionals in an active film studio. Students are able to feel completely integrated within the Berlin filmmaking community, working in an environment that is steeped in cinematic and filmmaking history. Classes are primarily delivered in English, in accordance with the school's accreditation with the University of West London, the top modern university in London for employment.

Met Film School Berlin is based at BUFA; the studio that has been home to film productions since the Weimar Republic and is one of the oldest film studios in Europe.

In 2015 Met Film School Berlin launched a partnership with YouTube Spaces and greatly expanded its facilities. Students will now benefit from access to state of the art training spaces including a fully equipped I,500sq ft studio, two standing sets, a 5.1 surround sound screening room and post production suites. This will not only provide enhanced training opportunities for current students, but also create greater graduate and networking opportunities. The collaboration with YouTube will allow Met Film School to respond to the latest digital content trends and our students will be able to understand how best to leverage the platform for their own productions.

Met Film School Berlin is also a desirable destination for non-EU students seeking the flexibility to work whilst studying. It's possible for overseas students to work 180 half days per year (four hours a day) whilst studying in Germany.

OUR LOCATION BUFA STUDIOS

Met Film School Berlin is based at BUFA, the studio that has been home to film productions since the Weimar Republic and is one of the oldest film studios in Europe. The school's location enables students to have first hand experience of a working film studio on a day-to-day basis, and also places them in the heart of the city.

Created in 1917, UFA's studios (Babelsberg and the now-called BUFA) were considered to be the most modern in the world. The studios employed important directors, such as Ernst Lubitsch, famous for directing sophisticated comedies, and G.W. Pabst, a pioneer in the expressive use of camera position and editing techniques.



Today, BUFA is an active film studio whose stages offer a wealth of filming experiences for our students - Greenscreen, Live-TV studio set up, a standing set used for TV production and large stage for commercial use. Met Film School also boasts a partnership with YouTube, having launched a joint creator/ student space: YouTube Space Berlin @ Met Film School, which includes a screening room, a make-up room, postproduction facilities and a large 1,500 Square FT studio. Being in such close proximity to the industry offers our students access to the professional world of filmmaking.





The campus is based near the trendy Neukölln/ Kreuzberg area of Berlin. Students can expect a vibrant, diverse and extremely creative community.



The best way to learn filmmaking is to make films, with the support and guidance of experienced industry practitioners. Met Film School Berlin tutors are working industry professionals, all with a broad international experience in filmmaking and production. LIVING IN BERLIN



Berlin's charm lies in its unique landscape and undeniably diverse culture, with its world-class museums, art galleries, restaurants and nightspots.

The city is made up of 12 districts each one with its own distinct personality. Most Met Film students choose to live in the trendy districts of Kreuzberg and Neukölln. Kreuzberg is Berlin's most populous district and is a multi-cultural hub of bohemian culture. Bar Raval, a great Spanish "New Wave" bar and restaurant co-owned by actor Daniel Brühl (star of Goodbye Lenin) is a fashionable hangout spot for Kreuzberg locals who want an affordable evening out overlooking Görlitzer Park. Kreuzberg is also home to Würgeengel (the name comes from art-house movie classic "El angel exterminador" by Luis Buñuel, 1962), a colourful and vibrant venue with a lively atmosphere.

Covering nearly 34I square miles, it would be impossible to explore the whole city by foot. Fortunately, Berlin has one of the most extensive, efficient and affordable transport networks of any European city. The Underground (U-bahn), the overground Schnellbahn (S-bahn) and Ringbahn provide comprehensive access to most parts of Berlin and run through the night on weekends.

In addition, there is an extensive network of trams and buses including the number IOO and 200 buses which offer a cheap alternative to a sight-seeing tour as they take in most of Berlin's major tourist attractions.

STUDENT LIFE In Berlin



Berlin is an exciting, cosmopolitan, cultural and creative hot spot that continues to attract and welcome artists from around the world. It has an easy going attitude and its affordability gives everyone space to work as well as enjoy urban life.

The Berlinale is one of the top international film festivals in Europe and the well-respected Berlinale Talent Campus has included discussions by key film figures such as Jane Campion, Michel Gondry and Gael Garcia Bernal. Met Film School students are encouraged to make the most of this illustrious festival by attending the events on offer, which bring high profile professionals attending the Berlinale to workshops and discussions with 300 promising young film talents from all over the world. The talents profit from the experience of the professionals, who in turn gain fresh ideas from taking part and actively network within the filmmaking community.



At Met Film School Berlin students write, direct and edit their own films. In their last year of the BA (Hons) Practical Filmmaking course, students work towards producing a feature film. In 2014, students collaboratively developed a fiction script, drawing from their international backgrounds and their own experiences in Berlin. The final result is a unique coming of age story set in the city called "I Am Warm". For more information on this feature film project, please visit the film's official website: www.iamwarmfilm.com. In 2015 BA-students produced the feature length comedy "Krush", in which they made perfect use of the fantastic range of locations at their doorstep - the story is set in and around a film studio. This film is currently in post production.

In addition to the array of films our students make on their courses, we actively encourage them to get involved in making short films outside of their course of study, either by working on their own personal projects or by engaging with the filmmaking community locally or internationally using different platforms, competitions and festivals.

This year Met Film School Berlin launched its exciting new partnership with the world's biggest creator community online, YouTube, in the opening of YouTube Space Berlin @ Met Film School. This is the latest new venue for the most creative people in Germany, helping to foster creativity, entrepreneurship and partnership between top video creators and Met Film School students.

Following the launch of YouTube Spaces in London, Los Angeles, Tokyo, New York City and Sao Paulo, the YouTube Space @ Met Film School Berlin is only the second Space to open in Europe, and is a hub for screen creatives from all over the continent.






FACILITIES

Met Film School is not just a film school. We make films, offer postproduction services to the industry, and teach people to make films.

Our production company, Met Film Production, has just released the critically acclaimed documentary: How to Change the World.

Described as "a real life thriller with larger-than-life heroes" by The Huffington Post, the film premiered at the Sundance Film Festival in 2015 where it won the World Cinema Documentary Special Jury Award in Editing. Of the 19 UK

credits on the film, 4 are Met Film School undergraduate students and graduates, for whom the film provided a unique opportunity and first step into the world of professional film.

How to Change the World is the thirteenth film commercially released by Met Film Production in the last 7 years. This ongoing success story is just one of the ways in which Met Film Production, Met Film Post and Met GO contribute to the School's teaching philosophy – together building a synergetic environment in which

education and industry become one. Graduate opportunities, professional feedback into the curriculum, pitch sessions, masterclasses, and an interchange of tutors all help build the bridge between the teaching environment and industry.

Met Film Production released Village at the End of the World, which premiered at the BFI London Film Festival and The Great Hip Hop Hoax, which premiered at the Edinburgh Film Festival. In 2012 it released Town of Runners, which was conceived and co-produced by

Met Film School One-Year Practical Filmmaking graduate, 2008, Dan Demissie. Postproduction for the film was handled by the Met Film's postproduction facility, Met Film Post. Town of Runners opened at the Tribeca Film Festival and gained worldwide release. It went on to win a number of awards. These included the Audience Choice Award Best Documentary, Bolder Life Festival, 1st Place Award for Adherence to Olympic Ideals, at the Atlant International FICTS Festival. Lipetsk and the Award for the Best Reportage at the BCN Sports Film Festival.

NETWORKING

At Met Film School we believe that the best way to learn filmmaking is to make films, with the support and guidance of experienced industry practitioners.

All of the tutors are working industry professionals, all with a broad international experience in filmmaking and production. They are as passionate about teaching as they are about film. Tutors are chosen for their knowledge of their discipline as well as their ability to inspire.

Met Film School Berlin has a great mix of international tutors but an even greater mix of international students (62 students from 37 countries in July 2015).

Our students learn to visually communicate across cultural borders and points of views. They acquire a solid practical and technical filmmaking and storytelling knowledge that will enable them to work across a huge range of international co-productions or in any one particular national industry if they wish to do so.

Through the on-site partnership with YouTube Space, students will also benefit from the organic collaborations with YouTube creators and experts during shared events, productions, seminars and screenings.

FESTIVALS

Met Film School Berlin staff are dedicated to helping students navigate the festival and commercial world of film to maximise opportunities for their projects.

Staff provide information and advice to students and graduates on film festival strategy and on the other opportunities for exhibiting their work including the internet.

Simon Benro graduated from the One-Year (Cert HE) Practical Filmmaking course in 2015. His graduation film Temporary Discomfort has screened at numerous festivals including Shortcuts Berlin, Berlin Independent Film Festival. Boddinale Film Fevstival Berlin. International Filmmakers Festival of World Cinema and Landes Film Festival Berlin, where it won two awards in the Best Drama and Best Actress categories.



MET FILM SCHOOL

Met Film School London opened it's doors to budding filmmakers twelve years ago. establishing the school as London's leading provider of practical filmmaking courses. The school is part of the Met Film Group, which also includes Met Film Production and Met Film Post. This enterprise allows Met Film to make films, teach people the skills that they need to make films and offer postproduction services to filmmakers, keeping them completely integrated within the film industry.

Met Film School London follows the exact same ethos as the Berlin school. On most of the courses offered, students will write, produce, direct and edit their own short films and fully engage with the art of collaborative filmmaking. The school's tutors are all working industry professionals from the world of TV, feature films and commercial filmmaking.

Met Film School offers a wide range of filmmaking courses including undergraduate and postgraduate courses. In addition, it offers a range of short full-time, part-time and weekend courses spanning directing, screenwriting, postproduction, producing, cinematography and documentary filmmaking for adults and young people.



Met Film School London is based at the world famous Ealing Studios located in West London. The studio has a rich and important history and is the oldest continually operating studio in the world producing both a range of feature films and TV series annually. It has been making feature films since 1902 and is perhaps best known for its Ealing Comedies produced in the 1940s and 1950s, including The Ladykillers and the Lavender Hill Mob.

In recent years Ealing Studios has been used for a range of high profile screen productions including Downton Abbey, Oscar winning feature film The Queen, Star Wars: Episode II. Bridget Jones: The Edge of Reason, St Trinians 2 and Notting Hill.

Met Film School's facilities include one of Ealing Studios original sound stages as part of its on-site studio space.



London has been the backdrop to an enormous range of films, from the swinging streets of Alfie to the contemporary Harry Potter movies.

Filming in the capital has doubled in the past 10 years. 2014's production spend across film and TV reached over £2 billion, the highest ever figure recorded. London's screen industries are going from strength to strength with productions made in the city such as Paddington, Downton Abbey, Sherlock and Fortitude gaining international acclaim.* (*Film London 2015)

More producers than ever are choosing to have their films made in the city due to the world-class facilities on offer and it has never been a more exciting time to learn to study filmmaking in London. More generally, students in London are able to experience one of the most diverse cities in the world, where more than 300 languages are spoken and a wealth of different cultures live side by side. Students will be taught the skills to become the next generation of screen professionals in an artistic and creative environment steeped in cinematic history.

There are now over 50 film festivals hosted in the city. Studying in London means there is access to a range of moving content resources from the British Film Institute. The Cinema Museum and the Reuben Library, as well as the vast number of film clubs and societies around the capital.

The role of the Director demands a range of inventive, technical and leadership skills in the realisation of film and small screen content. The MA Directing course is an intensive practical course that will add depth to the students' techniques and knowledge, whilst allowing them to regularly produce filmed content with the guidance of industry professional tutors and staff.

This MA course is designed to give students a comprehensive grasp of what would be expected of a multi-faceted Director in today's industry, from managing the technical team, casting and guiding actors and delivering content within their own distinctive vision. Students will be challenged and guided through workshops and on-set training to develop a distinctive directing style.

Additional topics covered include the life and work of a director, fundamentals of dramaturgy, the role of improvisation, script analysis and preparation, a survey of directing techniques, breaking down scripts, scene analysis, and the role of the creative team.

This course is delivered within three phases. Phase I starts with Induction Lab, which is a comprehensive exploration of core filmmaking skills, industry knowledge and creative practice. By the end of this training, students will have developed their essential technical skills and conceptual understanding of screen content. This is followed by Directing Boot Camp, which covers the key creative and

technical skills that anchor the director's craft and provide the foundation to more advanced techniques and the ability to carve out their own distinctive voices as a Director.

Phase II begins with the Advanced Techniques for Directing Actors module, which exposes students to a range of directing approaches through workshops in director's preparation, breaking down scripts, working with actors, and improvisation.

The students then embark on the Visual Language of Cinema module. During this module students complete an Intermediate Film, allowing the students to further their personal development as filmmakers in the run-up to the Master's Project. Students will be responsible for the scheduling, shooting, editing and crewing of the Intermediate Film.

The final module in Phase II is the Director's Craft and Creative Collaboration, which focuses on the director's collaborative role across the creative industries.

The final phase consists of the Master's Project, a self-directed module requiring each student to work under the guidance of a faculty advisor and demonstrate the necessary skill-set required as a director to deliver creative filmed content for a specific media platform. Projects can cover a range of formats and genres, including, but not limited to, a short fiction narrative, experimental film, documentary, TV pilot, or webseries.

BA (HONS) PRACTICAL FILMMAKING



BA (Hons) Practical Filmmaking is designed for those who are looking for an intensive, practical, Two-Year degree course in screen storytelling.

Students will be equipped with the creative and technical knowledge needed to take their first steps into the exciting worlds of film, television and online media. Those studying this course will gain a comprehensive range of production skills that focus on storytelling, creative development, writing, directing, producing and editing. In addition, they will develop an understanding of movements in film, style and associated critical analysis skills, as well as a thorough appreciation of contemporary industry practice.

There are six semesters of teaching that progress through the Two-Year BA (Hons) Practical Filmmaking course: Short Form, Factual, Fiction, Episodic, Long Form Storytelling, Creative Practice and the final Graduation semester. There are five interrelated subject areas running through each semester, which are: Ideas and Story, Character and Performance, Image and Sound, Post-Production and Screen Business. On graduating from this course, students will be technically assured in many aspects of production and post production for film and related media and have a show-reel consisting of short, factual, fiction and episodic productions that demonstrates their screen storytelling. Students are exposed to industry experts

throughout their time on the course, acquiring the skills for a career as a writer, producer, director, cinematographer, editor and other roles within the screen arts. Students are encouraged to work independently as well as within a group of creatives within a professional set environment.

This course is aimed at students looking to gain the skillset needed to fast-track their career within the screen arts industry.

The Practical Filmmaking Diploma (DipHE) includes all of the areas covered by the One-Year (Cert HE) Practical Filmmaking course as well as an additional module in Episodic production, which is a unique style of storytelling with growing employment opportunities. Examples of episodic storytelling include: reality, soap and web series.

By the end of the course students will be technically proficient in all aspects of production and ready to launch a professional career within the creative screen industries. This includes writing, directing, producing, camera, sound, lighting, editing and postproduction. In addition, students will be practiced in the pitching process and the application of professional on-set etiquette.

In Year-One students study Visual Storytelling, where they develop techniques to generate, communicate and evaluate ideas and stories across a range of different forms and formats and utilise the dramatic principles of conflict, character and structure in order to create their own oral, written and visual stories. This is followed by Fiction Production, where students are introduced to the subject areas of Character Performance and Postproduction practices, as well as gaining a comprehensive understanding of Screen Business.

In the third module, students cover Factual production and have the opportunity to produce either a documentary, branded content or a social change campaign with the support of industry professional tutors. The final module is Episodic production, introducing students to the emerging online screen industries and multi-cam set up for sitcoms, webisodes or factual productions.

Students who successfully pass all modules will receive a Diploma of Higher Education.

This course is aimed at students who are looking for a fast-track course that will provide them with practical skills for work in the screen arts industry within an intensive eight-month period.

The course equips students with the professional, creative and technical knowledge in demand today within today's creative industries of film, television and online media. Fully adapted to the changing environment of the industry, students are exposed to industry experts throughout their time on the course, acquiring the skills for a career as a writer, producer, director, cinematographer, editor and more.




