Carefree Living







An Investment in Your Future

A university degree is an investment in your future. When you hear about student debt it can seem quite daunting and put some people off pursuing their university dream. But put into context, the Institute for Fiscal Studies estimates that the wage difference between graduates and school-leavers has stayed at about 35% for the past two decades.

How much does it cost?

The tuition fees in Northern Ireland (£4,160) are substantially less than those in the rest of the UK (approximately £9,250 per year). Student fees payable are dependent on the 'residency' status of each student as determined by their local Education Authority and for the 2018-19 academic year tuition fees were:

How are my fees paid?

Tuition Fee Loan / Grant

Students can apply to the Student Loan Company (SLC) for tuition fee funding.

Pay in full at Enrolment

Tuition fees can be paid by cheque, debit/credit card or bank transfer on registration and enrolment.

Direct Debit Instalments

A 25% non-refundable deposit by cheque, debit/credit card or bank transfer is payable on registration and enrolment, with the remaining balance split over five equal instalments.

Sponsor

You may have an agreement with a sponsor, e.g. your employer, to financially support your studies for the academic year. For further information, visit the College website.

How do I meet my cost of living expenses?

A Student Maintenance Loan and/or Grant is available to eligible students to help with day-to-day living costs whilst you are at university. The maximum amount you can get depends on a number of factors such as household income, whether you are living at home or away from home, and whether you are an independent student. Maintenance loans are added to any other student loan taken and are repayable. Grants are not repayable.

How much will I pay back each month?

When you begin employment and are earning over the Student Loan Company threshold for repayment, the amount you repay will be linked to your income. Once you earn over £18,330 a year (relating to 2018-19), you will repay 9% of anything over this amount. If your income is below £18,330, or drops to below that amount, you will not have to make any repayments. The time required to repay a loan is based on income and amount borrowed, not on a fixed time period as with commercial loans.

Bursaries and Scholarships

A number of bursaries and scholarships are available to students who meet certain criteria.

CURRENT

Stranmillis University College Bursary

A means-tested bursary of \pm 500 per year is available to all full-time students, where the household income is less than \pm 19,203.

Halls Accommodation Bursary

An additional number of accommodation bursaries - a 50% contribution to the cost of a standard room in Stran Halls - are also available to students who meet the eligibility for a Stranmillis University College Bursary and are:

- the first person in the immediate family to go into Higher Education, or
- first year, male students studying on the BEd (Primary) course, or
- students with a mobility disability and eligible for Disabled Students' Allowance

Care Leaver Support Bursary

All verified Care Experienced students are eligible to apply for a free place in Stran Halls for the duration of their course plus a study support bursary of £600 in year 1, £800 in year 2, £1,000 in years 3 and 4 and an additional Care Leaver Graduation Bursary of £500 to assist with transition into employment or postgraduate study. This bursary is not means-tested.

Support Fund

A Support Fund is available to assist students experiencing financial hardship. The Support Fund prioritises groups such as those with children or with a disability, mature students and those whose return to full-time study has resulted in financial hardship.

Support Fund awards and bursaries are not repayable by the student.

Emergency Loan

The Support Fund also provides help for students who, for example, may not have received their Maintenance Loan at the beginning of term, in the form of an Emergency Loan. Emergency Loans are repayable immediately upon receipt of the Maintenance Grant.

Males into Teaching Scholarship

The scholarship is awarded to the top achieving male teacher education students who come from low income families. A scholarship of £1000 is awarded to a male student in each of our Initial Teacher Education (ITE) programmes during their second semester.





This course will appeal to those with an active interest in working with young people and provides opportunities to proceed to postgraduate courses in education, nutrition, training and health promotion.

What will I study?

Students undertake a broad and diverse programme of study. Each year you will study six modules that include a blend of practical and academic elements plus a period of work-based professional development. In Year 2 and Year 3, there is a range of module choices to allow you to develop greater degrees of specialism.

The Early Childhood Studies course is based on the concept of 'Educare'. It aims to investigate and advance a multi-professional approach to early childhood education and care services in Northern Ireland and beyond. The programme has been designed by professionals across the sector to meet the training needs of current and future practitioners. The course is aimed at both males and females and is offered on a full-time and part-time basis.



What will I study?

Early Childhood Studies provides a broad understanding of how young children think, learn and develop. The course modules cover three core themes 'Understanding the Child', 'The Child in the Learning Context' and 'The Child in the Family and Community'.

The course takes account of developments within the field of early childhood and reflects the multi-professional and multidisciplinary nature of contemporary early years services.

How will I study?

In addition to lectures, tutorials, workshops and individual/group projects, a substantial part of the teaching and learning process is related to the students' workplace experience. During your studies, you will have the opportunity to work in a variety of settings with children between 0 and 8 years. You will also have the opportunity to apply for an exciting study abroad adventure to live and study at one of the College's European or worldwide partner universities.

A one year postgraduate course, the PGCE (Early Years) is aimed at those who wish to prepare for a teaching career specialising in the 3-8 age range. The course runs for 36 weeks, beginning in early September. The course is assessed wholly by course work and continuous assessment, including the assessment of practical teaching.

What will I study?

With the increased emphasis on play as a medium for teaching and learning, the course aims to provide an in-depth knowledge and understanding of how playful approaches to teaching and learning can be effectively implemented.

The course also focuses on the integrated nature of children's learning and how the six key areas of learning at Key Stage 1 are taught through the use of themes. The content of the Revised Northern Ireland Curriculum for Key Stage 1 is examined and the transition from play–based to more formal activities addressed.

How will I study?

In addition to seminars, tutorials, workshops and individual/group work, you will undertake an 18 week programme of mostly school-based professional placements: including five weeks in a nursery setting, five weeks in a Foundation Stage classroom (i.e. Year 1 or 2 in a primary school), five weeks in a Key Stage 1 classroom (i.e. Year 3 or 4 of a primary school) and two weeks in an alternative educational setting.

Who will be teaching me?

In University and on your school-based professional placements, you will be taught, assessed and supported by an exceptional team of internationally recognised, research-led and experienced practitioners. As a small, specialist institution, our tutors get to know you – your strengths, your weaknesses, your abilities and your talents – and will support you to become a learning leader.

Application

In addition to the entry requirements, substantial and recent experience of working with children in the 3-8 age range will also be required. Entry to the PGCE (Early Years) will be based on qualifications, reference, relevant experience and an interview. Due to the competition for places, admission requirements may be enhanced at the short-listing stage, and applicants who are short listed will be called for interview, which will include a short presentation by the candidate.

A two year, full-time course delivered at Belfast Met, the Foundation Degree consists of 12 compulsory modules: Physical Activity and Sport for Specific Groups, Introduction to Management in Health Physical Activity and Sport, Fitness Testing and Training, Physical Activity Lifestyle and Wellbeing, Practical Studies, Anatomy and Physiology for Sport and Health, Introduction to Health Sport and Exercise Psychology, Applied Sport and Exercise Psychology, Personal Professional Development, Event Management in Health and Physical Activity, Work-Based Experience and Research Project in Health.

A range of work-based placements, opportunities to volunteer at live sporting events run by Belfast City Council and project-based assessments complement your academic studies. Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to Year 2 of the BSc (Hons) Degree in Health, Physical Activity and Sport at Stranmillis University College.

Early Childhood Studies

The Early Childhood Studies programme focuses on the key theories, concepts and application of working practices with children in the age range 0 to 8 years. Academic modules include Child Development, Learning Through Play, The Acquisition of Language and Communication Skills, Safeguarding Children, Developing Skills and Strategies for Managing Children's Behaviour, Working With Children with Additional Needs and Science and Technology in the Early Years. A varied programme of professional placements complements and supports your classroom learning.

The course is delivered by the Regional Colleges and can be studied full-time (2 years) or part-time (3 years) depending on location. Graduates who achieve the desired standard may be eligible for articulation to Year 2 of the BA (Hons) Early Childhood Studies degree [full-time or part-time]. Master of Teaching (MTeach)

The online Master of Teaching (MTeach) offers a blend of learning opportunities for the practitioner who aims to advance their teaching skills while working. Studying at a distance means you can also visit Stranmillis for support/supervision and you can avail of both our online resources and on-campus facilities.

Master of Education -Education Studies (MEd)

This specialist option draws upon a wide range of academic disciplines (such as history, philosophy, psychology and sociology) to further a student's understanding of learning and educational contexts. Education Studies looks at how we learn, from early childhood through the years of compulsory schooling and into adulthood.

Master of Education -Pastoral Care (MEd)

This specialist option addresses a need for high-quality professional development in the critical and challenging area of pastoral care and equips students to respond effectively to a range of challenging pastoral situations such as children experiencing abuse, bullying or mental health issues.

Master of Education -SEN Literacy Specialist Option (MEd)

Recognition of Prior Learning

The degree recognises and supports existing professional development activities. Candidates may seek accreditation for completed school-based professional development activities. Application for credit transfer and exemption from module requirements must be made upon enrolment.

Application Procedures

Selection Criteria for QTS Programmes: BEd (Hons) and PGCE Courses

The teacher education requirements are in compliance with General Teaching Council (NI) accreditation and Department of Education (NI) guidelines as part of the University College's approved programmes leading to Qualified Teacher Status. Entry is competitive and the University College will take account of the following:

- nature and level of academic performance and potential
- Personal desire, motivation and commitment for the course and for teaching, evidenced in personal statement
- relevant experience in a structured environment
- interview and presentation

Entrance Requirements

All applicants must have completed GCSE Mathematics and English at grade C or above. Some courses have additional Science requirements. Applicants for BEd (Primary) and PGCE will also be required to have achieved GCSE Grade C in a single or combined science subject and applicants for BEd (Post-primary: Mathematics and Science) require a minimum of BB in GCSE Double Award Science. At minimum, entrants must be able to satisfy the General Entrance Requirements of Queen's University.

A-level entry requirements for each course are outlined in the Undergraduate Entrance Requirements 2020 table on page 31.

The following qualifications (at approved standards) may be used as alternatives for GCE A-Level examinations:

- BTEC National or Higher National Certificate or Diploma
- International Baccalaureate
- Scottish Certificate of Education
- Irish Leaving Certificate
- A recognised Access Course.

For the **PGCE Early Years**, the minimum requirement for admission is an upper second class (2:1) honours degree in the area of early years or a degree with significant early years content. Account may also be taken of the range and quality of the candidate's GCSE and GCE A-level results. Substantial and recent experience of working with children in the 3-8 age range is required. Relevant experience may include, for example, work as a classroom assistant. This experience must have been gained at the time of application.

Applicants are advised to consult Academic Registry if they have queries about their qualifications.

Applicant Days

To help with your decision making process, various programmes will hold course specific applicant days. Please visit our 'Applicant Days' web pages to help you identify the main things that you have to do throughout the application cycle – both before and after you make your application.

Personal Statement

Your personal statement is your opportunity to tell us what motivates you, what your ambitions are, your transferable skills, about research you have done and your experiences, including volunteering. It should prove your commitment and demonstrate relevant, structured work experience.

Interview and Presentation for Initial Teacher Education, PGCE and Early Childhood Studies

All shortlisted applicants for BEd (Hons), PGCE Early Years and BA Early Childhood Studies will be required to attend an interview and deliver a presentation to a selection panel. The interview and presentation are used to assess the suitability of the candidate and whether they possess the qualities which, after development, will help to make the applicant an effective classroom practitioner and a person whose professional views will command respect.

Interviews are held in the University College and a candidate will normally be interviewed by a panel of two, at least one of whom will be a member of the University College's academic staff, whilst the other may be a serving or retired education professional.

Deferred Entry

The University College does not accept applications from students who wish to defer.

Application Procedures

Applications from Mature Students

Stranmillis welcomes applications from mature students who have interrupted their studies for several years or did not have the opportunity to enter higher education.

We require evidence of recent academic study. The qualifications most frequently offered by such candidates are Access courses, A-levels, Diplomas, Foundation Degrees, modules of the part-time BA Early Childhood Studies degree and Open University credits. All applicants to the undergraduate courses must possess GCSE English and Mathematics at Grade C or above (or acceptable equivalents).

Medical Fitness

All candidates who have accepted a firm offer of a place on any course must complete and return a Declaration of Health. In the light of the replies given, the University College Medical Officer will classify the candidate as fit, or seek specialist advice before classifying a candidate as either fit or unfit.

Enhanced AccessNI Check

It is a requirement that applicants who are accepted onto all undergraduate degrees and the PGCE Early Years programme at Stranmillis undergo an Enhanced AccessNI Check. This is administered by the University College and carried out by AccessNI. The University College acknowledges the key role of education in the rehabilitative process, and a criminal record will not debar an applicant unless the nature and seriousness of the offence in question are incompatible with:

- 1. the course applied for
- 2. the ultimate professional or vocational goal; or
