OUR CAMPUSES



1. Park, Cheltenham

- 20 minutes' walk from Cheltenham town centre
- 15 minutes' walk from Cheltenham Spa station

Set in picturesque parkland, Park campus in Cheltenham is far from quiet as it is home to our media, computing and (from September 2018) advertising, fashion design, graphic design and interior design students. Whether using our state-of-the-art computing and technology suite; our professional music, film. TV and news studios: or our brand new dedicated design spaces, you will learn using the same equipment you'll find when you go into industry. Originally laid out as a zoological garden with its own lake and elephant walk, Park campus is a technological hub just 20 minutes' walk from Cheltenham town centre and 15 minutes from Cheltenham Spa station.



2. Francis Close Hall and Hardwick, Cheltenham

- 10 minutes' walk from Cheltenham town centre
- 20 minutes' walk from Cheltenham Spa station

We have been training the teachers of tomorrow at our Francis Close Hall for over 150 years. Historic it may be, but the campus, also home to our health and social care. liberal arts and natural and social science courses, has fully refurbished labs with top-spec equipment and its own forensic interview and virtual reality suites. Just a few minutes' walk away, Hardwick is a thriving hub of creativity with its own gallery and photography and fine art studios, all packed with industry-standard equipment.



3. Oxstalls, Gloucester

15 minutes' walk from Gloucester city centre and station

Just 15 minutes' walk from Gloucester city centre, Oxstalls is home to our sports, business, nursing and performing arts courses. You'll get hands on with elite athletes in our internationalstandard sports centre (opening September 2018) and sports science labs, work alongside real businesses in our brand new Business School (opening September 2018), develop your nursing skills in our fully equipped clinical suite or get creative in our purpose-built performing arts and events centre with studios and multimedia spaces.











POUR NEW BROADER HORIZON

Dominating the city skyline, Gloucester Cathedral is always worth a visit. You can enjoy the quiet of the cloisters, visit the many exhibitions or, if you prefer your evenings with a magical flavour, go on a Harry Potter tour around the building, which featured as Hogwarts in the film series.

Home to Gloucester Rugby. Kingsholm Stadium is situated in the middle of the city. Off-season it regularly hosts pop concerts and has welcomed acts including Tom Jones, McFly, The Wanted and Jess Glynne.






FESTIVAL

Halls of residence

Moving away from home is an exciting step to take, but it can also be a daunting prospect. Our halls of residence offer the best of both worlds, giving you freedom and independence but with support close at hand. We currently have approximately 1,800 places in halls of residence on or near all of our campuses. Most rooms are en-suite and prices range from £100 to £189 per week and all include utility bills, internet and basic contents insurance. Our Pittville Student Village (see p12) in Cheltenham opened in 2017, while opening in September 2018 will be a brand new development at Blackfriars in Gloucester city centre, which will see almost 300 new rooms spread across townhouses, cluster flats, and studio bedrooms.

University-approved housing and private landlords

We hold a large database of approved housing in Cheltenham and Gloucester that meets our strict safety standards. We also have information on lodgings in which you can live in the same property as a landlord - a popular option for mature and international students. We can additionally provide details of local bed and breakfasts should you need temporary accommodation at any time.

Accommodation guarantee

We guarantee you a place in university or partner-managed halls of residence or university-managed accommodation if you accept us as your first choice and apply for accommodation by the UCAS decision deadline (usually 2 or 3 May, see www.ucas.com for latest information). International students are guaranteed a place in halls of residence by making their accommodation application by the university deadline (see www.glos.ac.uk/accommodation for latest dates).

YOUR FUTURE, OUR DEGREES

Honours degree

3 years full-time (levels 4-6)

This is the standard three-year option after which you will be a Bachelor of Arts (BA), Bachelor of Science (BSc), Bachelor of Law (LLB) or Bachelor of Education (BEd), depending on your degree.

Fast-track Honours degree

2 years full-time (levels 4-6) Some courses offer a fast-track option where you can graduate with a full Honours degree in two years rather than three.

Honours degree sandwich

4 years full-time (levels 4-6)

These degrees offer a 48-week work placement in the third year.

Foundation degree

2 years full-time (levels 4-5) These degrees are for students who aren't sure whether they have the qualifications for a full Honours degree.

Level 6 Honours degree

I year full-time (Level 6)

These degrees are for students who already have higher education experience and qualifications such as a Foundation degree or Higher National Diploma which they want to top up to a full Honours degree.

We offer over 80 undergraduate degrees so there's plenty for you to choose from. There are often several options, depending on whether you want to do a course fulltime, part-time or with a placement year.

Mature students

We welcome applications from mature students (aged 21 or over) and do not necessarily require the same academic qualifications as from school-leaving applicants.

Fees and Funding of Gloucestershire

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The tuition fees for our courses are listed below*.

You don't have to pay the fees up front, as most UK students are able to take out a government Tuition Fee Loan. You only start to pay this back after leaving university and beginning to earn more than £21.000 per year**. Your payments stop if your earnings fall below this amount.

Student loan to cover tuition fees

As a UK-based student planning to study for university, you are eligible to apply for a Tuition Fee Loan. This loan will cover the costs of your tuition fees and is paid directly to your college/ university once your attendance is confirmed. Although you will need to pay back your student loan, this will not be until you are earning over £21,000*. As an example of the amount you will repay, when you're earning £22,000 a year (£1,833 a month before tax), the repayment sum equals £27 each month.

Student Maintenance Loan for living costs

If you've lived in the UK for three years prior to study, you can apply for a Student Maintenance Loan to help towards your living costs - up to £8,430 per year if you live away from home to study and up to £7,097 if you stay at home**. The amount you are eligible for depends on where you live while studying, where you choose to study and your family household income. Again, this loan will need to be repaid but not until you are earning over £21,000 a year.

Additional nonrepayable grants

Specific government grants may also be available for students with disabilities.

What qualifications do I need?

Our students come to university with a wide variety of qualifications or equivalent work experience. These can include A levels, BTECs, National Certificates or Diplomas, NVQ Level 3, and International and Welsh Baccalaureates, All applicants should have Grade 4/C in English at GCSE, or the equivalent. Some courses require GCSE Maths at Grade 4/C, or equivalent.

We also welcome applications from students with the Advanced Diploma qualification and accept the diploma at its full UCAS tariff value for all our courses.

The university requires you to have at least two A levels (or equivalent) to begin an honours undergraduate degree programme or at least one for a Foundation degree.


When and how do I need to apply?
