

Students can easily get to us from all over the country, and from all over the world.



By car

Cirencester is easily accessible by car. Leave the M5 at Junction 11a and follow the A417 towards Cirencester. The University is clearly signposted from the Cirencester bypass. Our postcode for sat nav: GL7 6JS.



Cirencester's nearest railway station is at Kemble (around five miles from Cirencester) on the Cheltenham-Swindon-London line. Trains run to Stroud, Gloucester and Cheltenham (for the Midlands and North) and to Swindon (for London Paddington, Reading, Bath, Bristol and South Wales). There are three direct services each day to and from London Paddington. Once at Kemble, it's just a 10-minute taxi ride to the University.



By coach

Cirencester enjoys a very regular coach service from the centre of London (Victoria Coach Station) and London Heathrow Airport with National Express Coaches, National Express also offers services to Swindon, Oxford, Cheltenham, Bristol, Birmingham and Newcastle from the London Road, Cirencester coach terminal.



When flying into Gatwick or Heathrow international airports, travel along the M4 to Junction 15 (Swindon) and then follow the A419 to Cirencester.

Form 491 is the innovative agritech businesses

Farm491 is the innovative agritech business incubator offered by the RAU. Through its state-of-the-art facilities, dedicated team and access to expert advisers, Farm491 supports agritech businesses and promotes technology and innovation within the sector.

Farm491 was allocated £2.9m of funding from the Gloucestershire Growth Deal.

In 2016, we launched our Trent Lodge Enterprise Centre, which provides an affordable and flexible working environment for new and existing businesses.

In July 2018 we opened the doors to a new £4.2m building; the Alliston Centre, part funded by the GFirst Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP). It is home to Farm491 businesses and the Cirencester Growth Hub, providing both dedicated offices and co-working spaces for forward-thinking entrepreneurs at every stage.

To support this expansion, Farm491 has successfully launched a new three year-long

European regional development funded programme called Inspiring Agritech Innovation (IAI) www.farm491.com/iai. This programme provides a comprehensive range of business support activities to aspiring agritech entrepreneurs to develop, launch and grow their ventures into sustainable businesses.

Agritech companies also have access to spacious, secure and practical workshop facilities, where they can research, create and test their products. These workshops are located at our Rural Innovation Centre (RIC) at Harnhill Manor Farm, just 10 minutes drive from the RAU campus.

The Farm491 project has access to 491 hectares of nearby farmland across five farms which gives you an excellent opportunity to learn in the field:

- Harnhill Manor Farm, an integrated livestock and cropping system associated with an organic outdoor pig herd
- Coates Manor Farm, arable cropped
- Fossehill Farm, an equestrian centre with stabling and livery facilities
- Access to Kemble Farms Ltd, a 900-cow allyear-round large dairy complex
- Access to Leaze Farm, a 300-cow autumn block calving herd

Rural Innovation Centre (RIC)

This multi-functional facility provides an invaluable on-farm resource for our students.

Based at Harnhill Manor Farm, the RIC offers teaching, training and event rooms, a demonstration area, a machinery workshop, laboratory facilities, community space and meeting rooms. It also provides external training capacity.


Enterprise and Entrepreneurship

edge enterprise practice and for making the development of students' entrepreneurial skills a priority.


Guided by lawyers, marketing professionals and accountants, students from all courses and years have the chance to realise their aspirations in a professional and rewarding environment.



Competitions

We run many business competitions which encourage our budding entrepreneurs. Our 'Think it' challenge allows students to submit a two-minute filmed business pitch. For those with more established business ideas, we hold our annual Dragons' Den Style Grand Idea business plan competition. Students present to an expert judging panel in the hope of winning £1,000 to invest into their business, as well as around £2,500 worth of in kind business support prizes.

Enterprise Society

Our student Enterprise Society provides the social side to the Enterprise and Entrepreneurship Programme. The society meet regularly to discuss ideas, plan events, and organise trips to entrepreneurial businesses. Recent speakers include; William Chase (Founder: Tyrrells and Chase Distillery), Levi Roots (Founder: Reggae Reggae Sauce) and Julian Dunkerton (Founder: Superdry).

Mentoring

Our mentoring programme has been going for many years and provides students with external guidance to help them progress their business. Students find it extremely useful in helping develop their business ideas.

First Steps Fund

Our First Steps Fund provides students, staff, and recent alumni with proof of concept funding of up to £250 to help them test their business idea.

Next Steps Fund

The Next Steps Fund provides students with the opportunity to apply for up to £1,000 of funding to help them overcome a barrier faced by their business.

Ask the expert

We invite professionals and industry experts to meet with our students on a one-to-one basis to discuss starting their own business.

Business incubation

There are desk and meeting spaces available within the Growth Hub for students running their own business alongside their degree. The space provides a professional environment from which to run a business and the opportunity to interact with, and become a part of, our start-up community.





myRAU is our new app that brings together different RAU systems into one customisable tiled interface.

IT facilities

Here at the RAU, we know IT is an integral part of our students' lives, both for learning and research, and also for relaxing and communicating with family and friends.

Students are able to bring their own laptops, tablets and smartphones and use our network for academic purposes and for personal internet access. Free copies of Microsoft Office 365 are available for downloading onto these devices.

We have four computer rooms, one open 24 hours a day, while Wi-Fi access is available across the whole campus (including all accommodation blocks), so our students have access to a high speed internet connection from any computer, anywhere on campus.

Our students have their own printing accounts, with black and white and colour printers available in the library and the computer rooms, to which they can also print from their own devices.

With over 140 Windows PCs available, all with Microsoft Office 365, Genstat, SPSS, Read and Write 9, and Mindgenius (to name just a few applications), there are plenty to go around. We also provide a wide range of specialised software, including geographical information systems and agricultural management packages.

All lecture presentations and other teaching resources are available on Gateway, our virtual learning environment, which students can access from anywhere in the world, at any time of the day or night.

You can benefit from a Livery and 491 hectares of practical learning space right on your doorstep. All our farms and the livery stables are located near the main campus and provide an ideal field laboratory for students and staff.

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Incorporating a range of different farming systems, our farms demonstrate a mix of enterprises.

Coates Manor Farm and Harnhill Manor Farm offer a variety of different farming systems. We also offer an equestrian centre with stabling and livery facilities at our Fossehill Farm.

All the farms are run on a commercial basis and our students benefit through access to their physical and financial data.

The mix of enterprises across the farms include cattle, sheep, outdoor organic pigs, horses and arable. Students also have access to dairy farms. These various enterprises are used for farm classes, demonstrations and projects as well as a focus for research. Field and plot trials are undertaken on the farms by commercial companies on an ongoing basis and there are several demonstration and trial areas.

The University farms are part of the Higher-Level Stewardship Scheme and are committed to enhancing the environmental value of their holdings. Find out more www.rau.ac.uk/farms



Harnhill Manor Farm

Harnhill Manor Farm is an example of an integrated livestock and cropping system, part of which is managed organically. It is associated with a 120-sow outdoor organic pig herd, managed as a joint venture with a local business partner. In addition, a mule, Lleyn ewe breeding flock is kept under a conventional farming system together with a calf rearing enterprise. Arable cropping is rotated with forage crops, grown to support the livestock and to facilitate an effective rotation to underpin the management of a mixed farming system.

Coates Manor Farm

Coates Manor Farm is predominantly arable cropped, with some pasture land supporting the equine activity. We currently grow feed and milling wheat, oilseed rape and spring malting barley.

Fossehill Farm Stabling

Fossehill Farm is adjacent to Coates. In addition to providing livery stabling for students, exercise facilities are also available. The stabling is set out over eight barns and features a 1,000m all-weather exercise track and an outdoor arena.

Kemble Farms Ltd

This large dairy complex, just half a mile from the main campus, provides outstanding opportunities for our students, allowing access to observe the commercial management of a high yielding 900-cow, all-year-round calving dairy unit.

Leaze Farm

To provide a contrast, students have access to this 300-cow autumn block calving herd, utilising a grass-based system.

Support

Students are at the heart of everything we do and ensuring that you have a positive experience during your time here is our number one priority.

One of the advantages of being a small university is that there is ample resource to go around, with committed staff such as personal tutors, who make themselves available on a one-to-one basis. From drop in services to professional support, our priority is our students' success. It's a caring ethos that our student community share in the form of their own peer support group, known as STARS.

At the RAU you are not on your own; there is always someone to support you. Our dedicated student advice and support network are committed to looking after your physical, mental and emotional health throughout your RAU journey.

Wellbeing

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We want all our students to feel that they have the support they need to thrive during their time with us, which is why we offer a flexible wellbeing drop in service to all students, Monday - Friday in the Student Support Services centre. These sessions offer support, information, and advice for a wide range of issues from finance to stress management and mental health.

Student Support Services Manager

Our Student Support Services Manager is always on hand to support you with any queries or difficulties that may arise and will signpost you to specialist provision if required.

Counselling service

Counselling is a confidential place for you to explore and understand your personal or studyrelated concerns with professional support. This may take the form of a one-off session, ongoing work with a counsellor, or signposting to other agencies as appropriate. The Student Counselling, Health and Wellbeing Officer is based in the Student Support Services centre.

Medical provision

The University Health Centre is conveniently located on campus should you need medical attention for illness or accident during your time here. The University Nurse is available via a regular drop in facility and you will have access to a GP and a nurse, alongside a dedicated Sexual Health Professional, Prescriptions can also be obtained from the Health Centre.

Students are advised to register with the local doctor's practice in order to access the on campus service.

Chaplaincy

The University is home to students and staff from a diverse range of faith groups, and provides a welcoming and supportive atmosphere for all. In addition to the Chapel, we also have a faith and reflection room for the use of all faiths and none, with the Chaplaincy Assistants offering a multi faith contact point.

Advice for dyslexic or disabled applicants

Our goal is to support each and every student and ensure they have a rewarding experience from start

The University actively welcomes applications from students with dyslexia or other impairments recognised under the Equality Act and promises to consider your application solely on academic grounds. We have designed our courses to be accessible to as wide a range of potential students as possible.

Please let us know about your dyslexia, disability or other learning difference as early as possible to ensure we can support you and have provision for your needs in place when you arrive. As some of our degrees are vocational, some modules do require physical activity or visual skills to complete them successfully.

To ensure you get the recognition and support you require from the start of your first semester, it is important that you send through your assessment evidence and apply for a Disabled Students Allowance (DSA) at your earliest convenience.

Medical or physical disability

For any other disability, please send a copy of a consultant's diagnosis or similar direct to our Disability Officer when you accept the offer of a place at the RAU enable@rau.ac.uk.

Disabled Students' Allowance (DSA)

UK students are advised to apply for a Disabled Students' Allowance as soon as the Student Loan portal opens. This is free, non-means tested support for dyslexia or a disability.

Dyslexia

We have an excellent track record of supporting the needs of students with dyslexia or other forms of specific learning differences and aim to be 'dyslexia friendly' in all our teaching and learning environments. Please send a copy of your diagnostic assessment (which must be from after your 16th birthday and by an educational psychologist or similar) direct to our Disability Officer as soon as you accept the offer of a place. You will then have access to copies of teaching materials in advance, 25% extra time in examinations and access to our Dyslexia Tutor to help you develop your learning skills.

Accommodation

There are three accommodation areas within the University campus that are ideal for postgraduate students.

Woodlands Lodge

Woodlands Lodge 1 is a catered block with a mixture of postgraduate students and students who request a quiet block. All the rooms are large en-suite, there is a lounge on the ground floor, and a small kitchenette.

Vic Hughes

Vic Hughes 1 is a self-catered block with a mixture of postgraduate students and students who request a quiet area. All the rooms are single en-suite, there are lounge areas on each floor and fully-equipped kitchens are shared by five or six students.

Garden House

Garden House offers quiet, catered accommodation for overseas and postgraduate students. All of the rooms are standard single, with shared bathroom facilities, a student lounge and a kitchen.

English language requirements

All students are required to hold a recognised English language qualification of at least GCSE grade C (grade 4 for new GCSEs) or an equivalent standard before they apply for a Student Visa. For students whose first language is not English, the University will accept International English Language Test (IELTS) with a minimum score of 6.5 average with no element below 5.5 taken within the past two years, and in some cases other equivalent recognised English language qualifications which meet B2 level.

Visas and immigration

The University helps all international students with their visa applications. This support is provided free of charge and the RAU has a high success rate in obtaining student visas for its students. Although it is your responsibility to check the requirements for entering the UK as a Tier 4

Following an undergraduate degree in modern languages, I spent eight years in the tea industry, starting out as a Trainee Tea Taster, moving on to become a Tea Buyer in the strategic buving team of one of the world's largest tea companies. During this time. I visited dozens of tea estates across Africa and Asia, developing an interest in sustainable sourcing. I was looking for a Masters course to add an additional layer of academic expertise to my professional experience.

I was drawn to the MSc at the Royal Agricultural University as it combined the aspects of international development with practical agricultural knowledge. A dynamic course for a rapidly-changing sector, this programme has been created in conjunction with our industry partners, including the National Trust and National Farmers' Union.

Working across the agriculture and food supply chain, you will gain a deeper understanding of the sector, the challenges of the future and how they interconnect.

Policy and strategy around the areas of food and agriculture are vital for the sustainable growth of any country. This is a time of unprecedented demand for innovative solutions to sustain the flow of high quality food to more people than ever before, alongside increasing demands for traceability and provenance.

Brexit also presents an opportunity for the UK to become an important world player in the production and supply of high quality, sustainably produced food. To secure this aim, numerous opportunities will arise for highly educated business-minded people who are capable of leading British food production policy.

If you have an inquisitive mind or wish to learn these skills, this course will help you develop the knowledge you need to begin and boost a career in the agriculture and food industry. We will provide you with important industry contacts and placements within major national companies. 

The GDA course was a valuable introduction to agriculture for me. Coming from a career in banking and with no farming background, it was initially a steep learning curve. I studied a wide variety of topics including arable, livestock, organic farming, scientific developments, countryside stewardship and farm business management. These gave me a strong platform of knowledge on which to build. Many of the modules included farm visits across a broad spectrum of enterprises and made use of the University's own farms in Cirencester.

The GDA cohort with whom I studied was a stimulating group, coming from a variety of professional backgrounds and with different levels of farming experience. The GDA may suit people looking to re-direct their careers towards agriculture or those seeking to complement existing farming experience with an academic qualification. There is also the opportunity (separate from the GDA course itself) to develop practical farming skills at the University's Rural Innovation Centre.

Alternative study pathway

You may opt to study for a Graduate Certificate in Agriculture. For this alternative qualification, you will study the core modules, but select no further elective modules:



Course Structure

With two entry points per year in September and February, the course can be studied full-time over one year or part-time over two years.

This rigorous and challenging programme equips students with the intellectual mindset, vocationally orientated knowledge and professional competencies to evaluate markets. property investments and development projects. For those seeking a career in real estate, the RICS accredited MSc Real Estate degree provides fulltime and part-time routes to complete professional status. Course structure

The MSc is studied full-time over 12 months or part-time over two years. To facilitate part-time delivery, where practicable, most lectures are concentrated on two intensive full days. However, students are also expected to undertake site visits and engage in other learning activities.

Students study nine modules including Research and one elective module. Students study four modules in the first (autumn) semester followed by four modules in the second (spring) semester. Research is taught throughout the year so students can submit their dissertation in September.

For the dissertation, students can specialise in International, Residential, Rural, Development, Finance, Heritage or other areas as agreed by the module leader and potential supervisor. Research guidance includes lectures and a research day,

involving practical classes on, for example NVivo, SPSS etc. Students engage in a blended range of lectures, live scenario case studies, site visits (including a trip to London), group assessments and technical interactive workshops. Teaching and learning takes place in small groups, and is enriched by site visits, industry speakers and a wide range of current electronic materials, including CoStar, BCIS. EGi. Argus* and RICS Red Book. You will also use Excel and statistical programs.

Working in real estate calls for good teamwork, and students develop this essential skill via interactive discussions, collaborative projects and industry exposure. Modules are assessed through case studies, research paper seminars, group presentations, online exercises, valuation computations, written reports, oral examinations, and other tasks.

If you're looking to fast track your way to a career as a Chartered Surveyor, look no further. This course, developed in partnership with the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (RICS), is highly regarded by the industry where our graduates go on to secure roles with national, regional and international firms, as well as for private and public property owners.

This course is aimed at those people who are wanting to qualify as a Chartered Surveyor specialising in the management of rural land and property. As well as agricultural land and woodland, farms and rural estates will often include other types of property; for example, residential dwellings and non-agricultural buildings let to other businesses in addition to water or wilderness. They often, therefore, support a diverse range of rural businesses and enterprises including farming, food production. tourism and energy generation. In addition the way in which rural land and property is managed also plays a vital role in the health of the natural environment in rural areas and also in the life of the communities within it. Land and rural property managers are therefore required to provide a wide range of advice to not only estate owners, but also farmers, tenants and rural business owners. This leads to a varied and interesting career.

To help prepare you for such a career this course covers a diverse range of subject areas including rural property law, farm and rural estate business management, and the management of the natural environment. Furthermore, due to our partnership with the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (RICS), most of the graduates from this course

Master of Science by Research (MScR)

This one-year full-time MSc by research programme includes training in research skills to help you effectively investigate the key challenges facing the agriculture, land management or equine industries.

The programme is completed when you submit your thesis for assessment at the end of the year and defend your research in a viva voce examination. Part-time is available over two years for UK/EU students.

Structure

The full-time Master of Science by Research programme is a one-year research project submitted as a thesis and examined in a viva voce.

This MSc in Historical Archaeology explores the period from c.1500 to 2000 and offers an exciting research-informed programme that critically considers contemporary issues, challenges and developments. It will provide you with a robust philosophical, theoretical and ethical framework for exploring the remains of the recent past. You will gain a solid grounding in an increasingly coherent and confident discipline which is international in perspective and reach.

The programme begins with a short field course which will introduce to you the core theory, practice and controversies of historical archaeology through the preliminary investigation of an historic environment. It is also a great opportunity to connect with your fellow students and the lead tutors. The programme then uses a series of detailed case studies to look at how archaeology can throw light on the emergence of the modern world system in the UK. Europe. Africa, the Far East and North America.

The course goes on to explore the analysis and interpretation of the remains of the recent past at three scales - the artefact, the building and the landscape. Students then apply these principles to, two specific areas of historic archaeology selected from; The Archaeology of Pioneer Colonies, The Archaeology of the First and Second World Wars and The Archaeology of Industry.

The landscape is the context within which all human activity takes place. Developing the ability to 'read' the landscape and to understand the role of natural process and human activity in shaping that landscape through time is the focus of this course.

The rapid growth of survey and visualisation technologies is transforming the nature of landscape archaeology. At the same time there are mounting pressures on landscapes from multiple factors including agriculture, forestry, recreation. urban expansion and climate change, all of which demand an integrative approach to management and conservation.

This course will equip you with the skills and tools to respond to those pressures and offers an innovative, dynamic and research-informed programme that critically considers the idea of landscape and contemporary issues, challenges and developments in Landscape Archaeology.

You will be provided with a robust philosophical, theoretical and ethical framework for exploring, recording and managing landscapes of archaeological and heritage significance. This includes engaging with the practice of Landscape Archaeology in the UK and internationally, in the light of rapid technological and methodological change.

From this course you will gain a toolbox of skills ranging from landscape survey and recording to remote sensing, geophysics and the digital landscape. You will also be introduced to key landscape shaping processes, particularly the integrated understanding and management of 'natural' and 'cultural' elements in the landscape.

You will apply that knowledge creatively to the analysis of complex, incomplete or contradictory areas of evidence through case-studies of complex landscapes ranging from the Prehistoric and Roman through the Mediaeval to the Post-Mediaeval and Industrial periods.

The ability to integrate investigation, understanding and management of cultural and natural landscapes is a sound preparation for careers, or further research, in landscape archaeology, heritage and history. Such skills are also highly transferable and could provide a stepping stone to careers within the wider environmental, countryside management and landward professions.
