# Levels of Study and How to Apply

We can provide guidance and support throughout your application to Lincoln.

#### Get in Touch

Postgraduate study offers a challenging and engaging balance of teaching and research. It can include seminars, tutorials, laboratory work, and research activities. Whichever programme you choose, you will be expected to demonstrate a high degree of independent study.

#### **Taught Programmes**

Taught postgraduate programmes comprise three main stages. The first two stages are Postgraduate Certificate and Postgraduate Diploma, which consist of a number of primarily taught modules that are individually assessed. The third stage, the Master's, usually consists of an individual research-based project supervised by an academic with expertise in the subject area. Taught Master's programmes typically last from one year full-time to two or three years part-time. They are delivered in a variety of ways, ranging from weekly tutorial and seminar sessions, to modular study blocks of two to three days.

#### **Research Programmes**

Postgraduate research programmes give you the opportunity to produce a piece of individual research, supported by a written thesis and oral examination. The University offers a programme of training in research skills. Your research is conducted under the supervision of experienced academics with specialist knowledge in the subject area you choose. When you are applying for a research programme, you should review the University research specialisms to ensure your research proposal fits the research expertise at Lincoln. If invited to interview you will be expected to demonstrate that you have the experience and skills to conduct postgraduate research in the area of your proposal.

Research degrees do not have a fixed duration as specific objectives and milestones can vary between projects. For example, full-time PhD students would normally expect to study for a period of three years and to have submitted their thesis for examination within four years.

#### Continuing Professional Development

The University of Lincoln provides a range of Continuing Professional Development (CPD) programmes and accredited short courses for working professionals to further refine their skills and knowledge.

#### PGCE Courses

If you have a more detailed research proposal you would like to include in your application, you can attach this in the 'Supporting Documents' section of the process.

# **Funding Your** Postgraduate Study

There are more ways than ever before to fund your postgraduate study, whether you are new to Lincoln or one of our graduates. Learn how loans, scholarships, and allowances can help you.

#### Postgraduate Loans

You may be able to apply for a loan of up to £10,609\* as a contribution towards your postgraduate taught course and living costs. This is paid into your bank account in three instalments during the academic year if you are studying on a one-year full-time course.

The UK Government has also introduced new doctoral loans of up to £25,000 for PhDs and equivalent postgraduate research programmes from 2018. Please see our website for the latest information.

#### Postgraduate Scholarships

#### **Tuition Fees**

You will need to have funding in place for your studies before you arrive at university. Your Postgraduate Loan may contribute to your tuition fees and you may pay your fees in instalments to the university.

# Research at Lincoln

From developing new medical technologies to preserving rare architectural treasures, the research of Lincoln's staff and students makes a real difference to society.

**Research Excellence** The Research Excellence Framework 2014 (REF) – the most recent national assessment of research standards across UK universities – highlighted the guality and breadth of research taking place at the University of Lincoln.

More than half (53%) of the University of Lincoln's submitted research was rated as internationally excellent or world leading (3<sup>\*</sup> or 4\*). The University was placed in the top 10 nationally for the quality of its research outputs in two subject areas, reflecting substantial investments made in developing science and health research at Lincoln. We are in the top 10 for the quality of our research in Agriculture, Veterinary, and Food Science, as well as for Allied Health Professions. #### The Doctoral School

The Doctoral School is a community of researchers, where ideas and experiences can be shared between disciplines. It provides opportunities for Master's by Research, MPhil, PhD, and Professional Doctorate students to communicate and interact with the wider research community.

#### Vital Advances in the Fight Against Superbugs

Scientists from the University of Lincoln are at the vanguard of international efforts to develop new drug treatments for the global fight against antibioticresistant bacteria, sometimes called 'superbugs'.

Dr Ishwar Singh (pictured), from Lincoln's School of Pharmacy, and colleagues have made vital advances towards developing a newly discovered antibiotic substance called teixobactin into a viable drug treatment.


It has been predicted that by 2050 an additional 10 million people around the world will succumb to drug-resistant infections each year. The development of a new class of antibiotics which can be used as a last resort when other drugs are ineffective is a crucial area of

study for healthcare researchers around the world.

In 2015 scientists in the USA discovered a new naturally occurring antibiotic called teixobactin by isolating microorganisms found in soil. Research teams around the world set about exploring ways of creating versions of teixobactin via chemical synthesis, so it could be developed as a potential new drug treatment.

The University of Lincoln's researchers, led by Dr Singh, have successfully produced a synthesised version of teixobactin and used it to treat an infection in mice for the first time. The breakthrough marks a significant step towards producing the first new class of antibiotic drug in 30 years.



This new method of imaging and treating cancers will eliminate some of the uncertainties associated with traditional X-ray therapy, and it is believed some of the more difficult tumours will become treatable and most patients will have better outcomes.

The University of Lincoln, in partnership with the Lincolnshire Bomber Command Memorial Trust, has helped create the International Bomber Command Centre in Lincoln.

Second World War are preserved for future generations. This work has been supported by a grant of £3.1 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The archive contains personal memorabilia and an extensive collection of evewitness testimonies from both sides of the conflict.

An element of Professor Martin Tovée's research involves tracking the eve movements of participants who have been asked to make a judgement about body size.

As part of their studies, researchers have undertaken cross-cultural investigations in South Africa and Nicaragua.

Liz Price, Dr Fiona Ashmore, and a team of economic development specialists at the University of Lincoln are working as part of an international project examining the rural digital divide. The aim is to boost business and help communities.

#### History and Heritage

Lincoln Cathedral overlooks the city and is one of the finest medieval buildings in Europe. Lincoln Castle is home to an original Magna Carta, dating back to 1215, as well as the Charter of the Forest. Having undergone a £22 million restoration project, it is the only place in the world where you can see the two documents side by side.

#### Arts and Culture

Lincoln offers a rich and diverse arts scene with public art, galleries, and studios across the city. These include the Usher Art Gallery and the Sam Scorer Gallery, as well as the University's own exhibition space. The city has a number of museums, including the Museum of Lincolnshire Life, The Collection: Art and Archaeology in Lincolnshire, and RAF Scampton Museum, which is sited at the home of the Royal Air Force Aerobatic Team, the Red Arrows.

A number of festivals are held throughout the year in Lincoln, including the Indie-Lincs International Film Festival, Asylum Steampunk Festival, the biennial Frequency Festival of Digital Culture, Lincoln Book Festival, and the Lincolnshire International Chamber Music Festival.


Lincoln is within easy reach of London and a number of other major cities including Nottingham, Sheffield, Leeds, Leicester, and Hull.

# **Our Campus** and Facilities

Lincoln was rated as 10<sup>th</sup> best in the UK for university facilities in *The Times Higher Education Student Experience Survey 2018.* This ranking is awarded based on how strongly students agree that their university has high-quality, centralised, convenient and affordable facilities, a good library, and good sports infrastructure.



At Lincoln, we understand the importance of giving you the strongest possible foundation to help you achieve your aspirations.

#### **Specialist Facilities**

Our Brayford Pool Campus has facilities designed for the subjectspecific needs of our students, whether they are studying science, arts, social science, or business subjects. Social learning spaces in our buildings are designed to encourage co-operation and study in a relaxed setting.

Our latest phase of development includes the Isaac Newton Building and Sarah Swift Building.

The Isaac Newton Building is home to the Schools of Computer Science, Engineering, and Mathematics and Physics. The development features specialist laboratories, workshops, and computer labs, along with a 500seat lecture theatre.

The Sarah Swift Building is home to the Schools of Health and Social Care, and Psychology, along with the Professional Development Centre. This building provides high-quality teaching and learning space for these Schools.

#### The Library

As a student at Lincoln we know you will want an excellently resourced, comfortable, and welldesigned library. We offer this in the Great Central Warehouse Library, which provides more than 250,000 printed books, and more than 400,000 electronic books and journals, as well as databases and specialist collections. The library is open 24/7 for the majority of the academic year.

#### Social Scene

The Lincoln Performing Arts Centre on campus hosts a wide range of performances, from family theatre through to live jazz in its Zing Café Bar. There is a range of food and drink options available across campus, including hot food, light snacks, and the chance to relax with a coffee and cake. The Engine Shed, The Platform, Tower Bar, and The Swan comprise the Students' Union-run venues.

#### Sports

The University of Lincoln has its own Sports Centre providing facilities including five-a-side football pitches, squash courts, fitness classes, and a well-equipped gym. The gym contains a wide range of cardio machines and resistance equipment, as well as a free weights area and boxercise and spinning studios. Included in the Centre are shower facilities, with saunas in both the male and female changing rooms. Students can pay for each session individually or via a monthly membership.

#### **Research Support Fees**

**Research Fees** 

Research students may be required to pay Research Support Fees (commonly known as 'Bench Fees') in addition to the standard tuition fee published by the University. The Research Support Fee covers a wide variety of items or activities which are essential to carry out the research, including project costs, the cost of specialist resources, equipment or materials, travel and conference attendance, books and laptops, as well as access to any specialist collections that may be required to support research projects. These will be informed by the research proposal submitted and will be calculated on an individual basis. How fees are used will depend on your research project.

Research Support Fees normally apply to science-based courses. However, please get in touch with the department you are applying to if you wish to discuss this prior to application. Any additional fees will be outlined in your offer letter, prior to accepting your place.

#### Additional Costs

The University of Lincoln sets its fees in line with the UK Research and

in 2019 this will be set early in the new year. The indicative fee level from UKRI for 2019/20 is £4,260 plus inflation. In 2018 European students were eligible for funding under UKRI support for postgraduate training. ### **Arts at Lincoln**

The University of Lincoln offers a vibrant and collaborative creative environment for those considering postgraduate study or research in the arts.

As a postgraduate student you may be looking to further your career or progress to a senior role, change career direction, start your own business, further your research interests, or simply pursue your passion in the arts.

The College of Arts provides an environment in which students can develop the knowledge and skills to forge a successful career. Graduates have gone on to become practitioners, establishing new businesses, developing new products, and becoming influential contributors to the creative industries, both nationally and internationally.

At Lincoln, we offer postgraduate programmes across a range of subject areas, including architecture and the built environment; design; English, journalism and public relations; film and media; fine and performing arts; and history and heritage.

The College provides inspirational learning spaces with specialist studios, labs, and workshops. Art, architecture, and design students have the opportunity to practise in dedicated studio spaces with access to specialist facilities including computer suites, 3D printers, wood and metal working equipment, as well as rapid prototyping and laser cutting resources.

Project Space Plus is the University's open space for exhibition, creative inquiry, experimentation, and contemporary thinking.

The University is home to the largest centre for conservation and restoration in the UK. The University's conservators have undertaken high-profile projects with clients including the National Trust, English Heritage, and the V&A Museum. Students can gain hands-on experience with a wide variety of historic materials and artefacts in the University's conservation labs.

The journalism newsrooms are well equipped with professional design and print production software. For those who specialise in broadcast production, there is a range of video and audio edit suites, portable cameras and audio recorders, lighting and sound equipment, and digital radio and television studios.

English students can benefit from masterclasses and lectures by industry experts. The Poet Laureate Carol Ann Duffy joined the University as Visiting Artist in 2015, and is one example of the vibrant community of scholars, writers and practitioners who contribute to our courses.

Students can study and research in the University's Great Central Warehouse Library, which provides more than 250,000 printed books, and approximately 400,000 electronic books and journals, as well as databases and specialist collections.

Film and media students have the opportunity to develop their skills working within a specialist production environment that boasts an impressive range of facilities, including multi-camera television studios, radio studios, a multitrack audio suite, a sound dubbing and foley theatre, video editing suites, audio editing suites, design and animation

suites, a photography studio, and a high-end post-production finishing suite.

The University is home to community radio station Siren Radio and the student station Brayford Radio. Both offer opportunities for students to gain hands-on experience.

The Media Archive for Central England, based on campus, is a public archive dedicated to researching and preserving collections of film and moving image materials. Its aim is to inform our understanding of the culture and history of the UK.

For performing arts students, the Lincoln Performing Arts Centre (LPAC) is a hub of creative performance where students can learn and rehearse in the Centre's 450-seat theatre, three large studio spaces, and a workshop for building sets and props. As well as student performances, the LPAC hosts a programme of comedy, dance, drama, and music throughout the year. Previous performers include the Reduced Shakespeare Company, Ballet Cymru, Chris Goode & Company, and Paines Plough.

With its magnificent cathedral, medieval castle, new International Bomber Command Centre, and an original Magna Carta from 1215, Lincoln is an inspiring city in which to study history and heritage. Students can access resources around the city, including at the Tennyson Research Centre based at the Lincolnshire Archives, The Collection museum, and the outstanding collection of medieval manuscripts and rare books which is housed at Lincoln Cathedral libraries.

#### MArch (ARB/RIBA Part 2)

The Master's of Architecture offers access to industry-standard facilities and the opportunity to study across a range of disciplines and styles.

There is flexibility to tailor your learning within a framework that satisfies the requirements of the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA) and the Architects Registration Board (ARB). It meets all points of the European Union Directive (EC2005/36) and is accredited by the Commonwealth Association of Architects.

This course encourages critical reflection on personal aims, achievements, and design philosophy within a framework of structured theoretical debate and individual research. There is an emphasis on developing professional skills through

Postgraduate Diploma in **Professional Practice and** Management in Architecture (ARB/RIBA Part 3)

This programme aims to develop the architectural professional practice skills essential for the management of the design process and construction of projects. This qualification is developed in accordance with the Professional Criteria requirements of both the Architects Registration Board (ARB) and the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA).

The programme is designed to enable Part 3 candidates to develop their knowledge, understanding, abilities, and skills in the professional practice and management of architecture.

Students have the opportunity to develop a comprehensive understanding of their obligations and responsibilities as a professional to clients, the profession, and society at large.

You may utilise laboratories and workshops to employ traditional model-making techniques, as well as digital fabrication technologies. After successful completion of the programme, you may choose to progress to the Postgraduate Diploma in Professional Practice and Management in Architecture (ARB/RIBA Part 3) as a pathway to becoming a registered architect.

The course is delivered in the form of workshops designed to develop and reinforce theory by placing this in a professional and practical context.

Students are required to be in fulltime employment typically within an appropriate UK-based design practice (or similar) under the direction of a UK 'Registered Architect', who acts as an employment mentor. The aim is for this mentor to assist the student in gaining appropriate professional experience through involvement in real-world business activities and project management throughout all stages of the project life cycle.

This experience must be documented in a Professional Education and Development Record, which will be supported by the completion of a Personal Development Plan and a professional CV.

In addition, Part 3 candidates are required to produce a Case Study Report, which is a critical analysis of a project with which they have been

personally involved from project inception through to completion.

Finally, all Part 3 candidates are required to attend a Professional Interview Examination in order to assess their overall competency to practise as an architect. After which, successful Part 3 candidates can apply to the ARB for inclusion on the Register of Architects and to the RIBA to become a chartered architect.



At Lincoln, postgraduate students wanting to pursue their passion for journalism can join a rigorous intellectual community of highly respected academics with extensive industry experience.

Academic expertise in the School of English and Journalism includes practising journalists and writers, and internationally recognised researchers. Students have the opportunity to hear from a number of expert speakers from industry and to benefit from the School's strong links with prominent organisations, including the BBC, Sky Sports News, ITV, 5 News, and Mortons Media Group.

Our facilities reflect those used in industry and include a suite of newsrooms incorporating professional design and print production software. For those who specialise in broadcast production, there is a range of video and audio edit suites, portable cameras and audio recorders, lighting and sound equipment, and digital radio and television studios.

The University's campus-based media offer opportunities to gain skills and experience, and include community radio station Siren Radio, student station Brayford Radio, the School's online news service LSJ News, and the student-run newspaper, *The Linc*.

The School is home to wide-ranging research expertise in journalism, with particular strengths in journalism and the world wars, the media of the African diaspora in the UK, and visual print archives. Researchers aim to examine the history of journalism in all its forms and to understand the changing nature of the media, assessing the impact this is having around the world socially, politically, and economically.

Our taught postgraduate students can receive expert training in their chosen discipline, being guided to produce high-calibre original work. We offer a multi-media grounding, with opportunities to specialise in specific media and genres, such as sports or arts journalism.

The MA Journalism is designed to prepare graduates for successful careers in print, digital, and broadcast journalism. It offers practical, professional, and academic training in journalism, with opportunities to gain experience in media organisations. You have the opportunity to be taught the art of journalism from a hands-on, multi-platform perspective, with the chance to specialise in the medium of your choice.

Our distinctive MA Journalism (Arts) programme offers the opportunity to learn to appreciate artistic movements, genres, and the sociological factors that underpin the cultural industries, and to communicate this to an audience. This programme emphasises reporting and reviewing the creative arts from the niche, such as sculpture, to the more popular, such as cinema and television, to emerging fields like webbased production.

The forward-looking MA Journalism (Digital) aims to prepare graduates for a career working at the forefront of the digital media revolution, where expectations of speed, accuracy, and quality are high. There is an emphasis on the technical side of digital journalism, as well as on core writing and production skills.

There is growing demand for science journalists who can report on issues such as health or the environment accurately and succinctly. Lincoln's **MA Journalism (Science and Environment)** programme offers the opportunity to learn how to take scientific news and turn it into engaging stories, without resorting to sensationalism or technical jargon. Previous speakers include Channel 4 Science Editor Tom Clarke, and naturalist and broadcaster Chris Packham.

The MA Journalism (Sports) is run by former and current sports journalists. Guest speakers have included ITV commentator Clive Tyldesley and Controller of 5 Live Jonathan Wall. Students have the opportunity to broadcast and produce their own sports content on one of our campus-based media platforms. 

#### MA Creative Writing

Our MA in Creative Writing provides opportunities for students to work closely with practising creative writers and hear from professionals from the publishing industry in guest lectures.

This programme aims to encourage you to balance creative practice with critical analysis, reflect on production processes, and hone your skills. There is a strong emphasis on the productive writer as a productive reader who is familiar with the literature being produced around them.

You have the opportunity to work in a variety of literary genres of writing, and there is support for students who want to publish their work, particularly in the core module Production and Publication.

There are opportunities to collaborate on an original piece of work with a professional writer outside of the University, and to have your work published and receive feedback from readers. Students can also participate in termly symposia and read their work to an audience.

The programme offers readings from established writers who speak about their work and may also run workshops

Continual assessment enables you to track your progression and become proficient through practice in your favoured genre. The final piece of work required is a 15,000-word creative dissertation.

Students can study and research in the University's Great Central Warehouse Library, which provides more than 250,000 printed books, and approximately 400,000 electronic books and journals, as well as databases and special collections. This programme is designed to provide training for a career in writing, from fiction to screen and radio adaptation. You have the opportunity to develop advanced communication skills, build a portfolio, and develop contacts which may open up career opportunities across the creative industries in publishing, research, teaching, and the media. This programme is an innovative joint offering between the University of Lincoln and *The Guardian*. It provides students with the opportunity to work across different genres and formats including poetry, fiction, life writing and script writing, to work with editors and publishers, and to write an extended piece of creative literature.

Teaching is enhanced by workshops, readings, and masterclasses by acclaimed authors from a range of genres, including Poet Laureate Carol Ann Duffy, naturalist Chris Packham, and art historian Andrew Graham-Dixon. Professionals from major publishers will contribute to the teaching and support, alongside *Guardian* editors and writers such as Associate Editor for Culture Claire Armitstead, freelance writer Stuart Heritage, and interviewer Decca Aitkenhead. A focus on the business of publishing aims to prepare students to enter the competitive world of contemporary publishing, as well as to develop the necessary skills such as creating an elevator pitch and writing first-rate submission letters to attract publishers and agents.

Staff involved in the teaching of this specialist programme may include published novelists, poets, and scriptwriters. The programme takes advantage of links to professional environments within journalism and London-based publishing to enhance student opportunities. You also have the opportunity to engage with editors and journalists working at *The Guardian* who provide additional masterclasses in aspects of professional writing.

Teaching takes place in seminars and workshops divided between *The Guardian* offices, based in the heart of the UK's publishing and media industries in London, and the University's Brayford Pool Campus in Lincoln.

#### MA History

This rigorous Master's programme is designed to give you the opportunity to develop your specialist knowledge of history alongside advanced research skills that are transferable to a variety of career paths, including PhD study.

Teaching is informed by research expertise in the School of History and Heritage. Students are encouraged to engage with our lively interdisciplinary research community and are invited to attend research seminars organised by the School. You have the option to follow three distinct pathways in the history of gender and sexuality, media history, contemporary British history, or pursue a general programme of study instead.

You can benefit from the historical resources available in the city of Lincoln, including the extensive materials at the on-campus Media Archive for Central England (MACE) and at the International Bomber Command Centre (IBCC). MACE holds a large amount of film and television material that gives unique insights into the Midlands and the wider world from 1895 to the present day.

The IBCC Digital Archive contains primary source material about the RAF bombing campaigns during the Second World War. It includes thousands of letters, diaries, and photographs, and features more than 900 oral history interviews with those involved on both sides of the conflict, in the air and on the ground.

An extensive archive of materials relating to the historical county of Lincolnshire can be found at the Lincolnshire Archives. The Wren Library at Lincoln Cathedral houses several thousand early modern books.

Students may also benefit from the University's on-campus Great Central Warehouse Library, which provides more than 250,000 printed books, and approximately 400,000 electronic books and journals, as well as databases and specialist collections.

Students have the opportunity to undertake an in-depth independent research project and a detailed dissertation. When writing your dissertation you can be supported by a supervisor.

This programme aims to develop the advanced knowledge and high-level research skills that are highly valued in the heritage and museum sectors, teaching and research roles. Some graduates may choose to pursue doctoral study and a career in academia.



Ethical leadership, a culture of good stewardship, and embedded best values have always been essential attributes for good governance and long-term success in organisations. These concepts are at the heart of the MSc Governance programme at Lincoln.

The global financial crisis, corporate scandals and collapses, and public concern over the apparent lack of effective boards have all contributed to an explosion of interest in governance practices.

This programme is structured with a focus on practical application in the business environment, and aims to provide students with a strong subject knowledge, and the latest thinking in the world of governance, leadership, accountability, sustainability reporting, business ethics, organisational and board effectiveness, finance, law, and strategic thinking. It explores concepts

and theories in the context of practical examples and leading-edge academic research.

The course is designed with the support of the Institute of Business Ethics and aims to develop future business leaders, managers, accountants, auditors, lawyers, solicitors and finance or governance professionals who understand and appreciate the importance of going beyond statistics and supporting good ethical behaviour in business to help companies to sustain long-term success.

It also provides the opportunity to increase awareness of governance of information, information technology, risk management, and the impact of cyber security, themes which are increasingly important in the business world.

Students may have the opportunity to undertake a client-based project as an alternative to the traditional dissertation. This option may be available to employed students who have access to an organisation to apply their academic knowledge and industry experience to a real-life business.

The programme also provides the necessary supporting evidence of professional knowledge to apply for CIPD Chartered Membership, subject to associated work experience.

Using critical analysis, self-reflection, and problem-solving techniques, you have the opportunity to learn how to develop and implement creative and strategic HRM solutions that drive organisational performance.

You can explore new ways of managing people in the modern workplace, taking into consideration people development and employee relations, and understanding the broader business concerns of senior management.

Students can benefit from the research specialisms within our academic team which include workplace flexibility, work and family, the economic performance of migrants in host countries, and the role of internationally assigned managers in multi-national enterprises. Other specialisms include dignity in the workplace, disability and employment, and identity at work.

This programme provides the opportunity to gain a professionally recognised qualification that can prepare you to think and operate at a senior level in this exciting sector. A two-day residential trip usually takes place early in the academic year, during which students are encouraged to develop their sense of self-awareness, and their own strengths and weaknesses as managers and colleagues. The cost of this is included in tuition fees.



#### **MBA** Leadership (Senior Leadership Master's Degree Apprenticeship)

The Lincoln MBA in Leadership aims to offer an intellectually stimulating programme which provides the knowledge, perspective, and critical understanding required to work at middle and senior managerial levels, or to enhance the skills of those already working at these levels.

Senior Leadership Master's Degree Apprenticeships are underpinned by the MBA Leadership qualification. The apprenticeship scheme has been created by the Chartered Management Institute (CMI), the Chartered Association of Business Schools (CABS), and higher education providers.

This programme is facilitated through the apprenticeship levy, is funded by the Government and employers, and is an opportunity to develop strategic leadership skills. The Senior Leadership Master's Degree Apprenticeship

combines a Master's degree, apprenticeship, and the option to achieve Chartered Manager or Chartered Fellow professional recognition.

The course is aimed at those in senior roles such as section leaders, executives, directors, chief operating officers, chief financial officers, chief information officers, and senior military officers. It could also appeal to those in the NHS, and the police and fire service.

The programme concentrates on strategic analysis, interdisciplinary skills, intellectual stimulation, and independent judgement. It covers core themes such as critical engagement, embedding theory in practice and global impact awareness. It builds these upon a solid foundation of core disciplines, including managing people, organisational management, marketing, virtual collaboration, and peer learning.

Example subjects for study include leadership, entrepreneurship, managing change, international finance, and ethics and risk management.

It is designed for students who wish to develop their careers by studying for a Master's degree in their chosen profession while remaining in their current employment. This is achieved through a combination of day release and assessment, and lasts for two years with an added six-month project.

The programme is a mix of blended learning and an online teaching approach. It draws on our expertise in delivering online programmes to work-based distance learners.

### **Science at Lincoln**

The University of Lincoln has a diverse and vibrant postgraduate science portfolio which is designed to produce the highly skilled individuals needed across a range of industries.

The College of Science offers programmes in chemistry, computer science, engineering, food manufacturing, agri-food technology, geography, life sciences, mathematics, physics, and pharmacy. We provide taught and research programmes, and students can study for an MSc, MSc by Research, MPhil or PhD.

At Lincoln, postgraduate students are a vital part of the College's research community. We aim to produce graduates that are equipped to address some of the major challenges in their field.

Postgraduate students join a thriving academic community, and are encouraged to develop important, career-relevant transferable skills in addition to deepening knowledge and expertise in their chosen area of science.

Students have access to specialist facilities across our campuses, including the Joseph Banks Laboratories (JBL) and the £28 million Isaac Newton Building (INB) on our main Brayford Pool Campus.

Life sciences students are able to access some of the latest equipment in research laboratories for molecular and cell biology, microbiology, tissue biology, bioacoustics, and DNA analysis in JBL.

Minster House has research laboratories for animal cognition, behaviour, and welfare research. Students can also access a range of resources including aquatic and reptile facilities, an insectary, and a bioacoustics laboratory. Chemistry students have access to high-quality facilities for crystal engineering, molecular and nanomaterials synthesis, and 3D molecular and materials modelling.

In INB, computer science students can benefit from advanced robotics and human/computer interaction laboratories, a mechanical and electronics workshop, and high-end workstations with full software development platforms.

Research specialisms include control and interaction in autonomous systems, particularly mobile robots and robotic manipulators, and their use in various domains. Research also focuses on the capture, transmission, processing, and understanding of images, video and other highdimensional data. There are studies on further aspects of computer vision and better living through technology. The Engineering Hub offers a range of laboratories and facilities for research in laser applications, metrology, driving simulation, vehicle control, noise and vibration, electrical power, biofuels, and robotics.

Academics have expertise in both mechanical and electrical engineering, with research focused in three main areas. These are intelligent systems, including computer-based control and the monitoring of complex machinery; power and energy, including renewable energy and electric vehicles; and manufacturing and materials, which features robotics and engineering applications of lasers.

Our geography students have the opportunity to work under the supervision of experienced academics who are conducting innovative research. We have strong links with external partners such as the Met Office, Environment Agency, and Natural England, as well as private sector businesses, via our Lincoln Centre for Water and Planetary Health and Rural Research Group.

We have an international outlook and Lincoln's mathematics and physics academics have collaborated with top research institutions in Germany, Japan, Norway, the Netherlands, Singapore, Spain, and the USA.

Pharmacy research is undertaken within the broad themes of molecules, cells, and people, and we engage with professionals working in hospitals, community and primary care practices, the pharmaceutical industry, general practice, and other academic institutions.

Food manufacturing students are based at our Holbeach Campus in the south of Lincolnshire, home to our National Centre for Food Manufacturing. Postgraduate students have the opportunity to conduct research utilising specialist food sector equipment and facilities.

These include automated production lines and processing technologies, a product development kitchen, sensory analysis suite, and laboratories for food microbiology and food chemistry research.

The University's 200-hectare Riseholme Campus, just north of Lincoln, is the headquarters for our Lincoln Institute for Agri-food Technology. Its membership spans specialisms in agriculture, artificial intelligence, robotics, ecology, hydrology, animal welfare, biology, genetics, food manufacturing, mechanical engineering, microbial resistance, new product development, supply chain management, and economics.

This programme aims to equip students with the knowledge and specialist skills necessary to progress to roles in the rapidly advancing computing and technology industries. This course is fully accredited by the British Computer Society.

Developments in artificial intelligence, computer vision, robotics, mobile technology, games applications, and data science have all become a normal part of society's interaction with computing devices.

Working alongside our academic staff, students have the opportunity to develop their critical understanding and practical experience in areas such as computer vision and surveillance, virtual/augmented/mixed realities, robotics, and mobile computing. This experience can provide the skills needed to develop novel solutions to current and future challenges.

The programme aims to enable the acquisition of skills through practical workshops in the laboratory, and

debates, lectures, discussion, and personal research.

Modules assume a familiarity with programming notions and the supporting mathematical framework, while presenting advanced concepts relating to the computing domain.

The School of Computer Science's research is internationally recognised, and areas of expertise currently include computer vision, medical imaging, autonomous systems and robotics, human-computer interaction, and games development.

Project work in this programme typically aligns with one of the School's main research areas, and students may have the opportunity to work alongside academics in these areas. These include the Lincoln Centre for Autonomous Systems (LCAS), which carries out research in robotics, integrating computing, sensing, and software to create intelligent systems capable of interacting with, and acting in, the real world.

The Interaction Lab (intLab) promotes better living through, and

with, technology as well as through monitoring and interventional uses of technology to tackle societal challenges. The Machine Learning Group (mLearn) focuses on better understanding of data for assessing equipment or biological systems behaviour, and predicting or avoiding system failures.

The Laboratory of Vision Engineering (LoVE) specialises in the capture, transmission, processing, understanding and exploitation of images, videos, and other highdimensional data across application domains.

A range of research opportunities exist for candidates to pursue studies in the rapidly advancing field of nanomaterials science. Current research areas include nanostructured soft matter, active matter, materials science, and molecular biophysics.

Students have the opportunity to work with our research groups. The Experimental Nanophysics and Nanotechnology Group brings together expertise in a range of disciplines to focus on various applications of nanotechnology, from renewable energy to nanomedicine.

A key aspect of our nanophysics research is focused on replacing energy from fossil fuels with energy from renewable sources. Energy generation from solar cells is a

The group is also developing multidoped semiconductor nanocrystals as intermediate band materials for improved solar absorption across the entire solar spectrum, as well as scalable, inexpensive and flexible techniques for the deposition of quantum dot films and carbon-based coatings and nanostructures.

Researchers benefit from working closely with colleagues in the Computational Physics Group as well as from the Schools of Mathematics, Pharmacy, Chemistry, and Engineering.

The Drug Discovery, Design and Delivery Research Group builds upon expertise within the School of Pharmacy and the College of Science as a whole. Our work covers preclinical aspects of the drug discovery and development pipeline from the identification of novel drug targets, and the design of new and improved drugs or antibiotics, to the development of improved methods of delivery.

There are opportunities for graduates to progress to careers in the pharmaceutical, cosmetics or food industries, and within academia.

# **Social Sciences at Lincoln**

The College of Social Science aims to provide a supportive, research-rich environment to help you build the knowledge and skills to develop your career.

At Lincoln, we offer postgraduate programmes in a range of subjects, including sport and exercise science, law, education, health and social care, psychology, and social and political sciences.

Students within the College have access to inspirational learning spaces. For those on our sports courses, the Human Performance Centre includes physiology, biochemistry, and dedicated biomechanics laboratories, and an 'endless pool' for research into swimming and triathlon.

The £19 million Sarah Swift Building includes clinical suites, modern lecture theatres, breakout areas for group projects and specialist laboratories for health and social care students. For those studying psychology, facilities in this building include a sleep laboratory, motor and EEG laboratories, a psychophysiology laboratory, and our 'BabyLab' – a specialist area for the study of child development.

Students can take advantage of the University's excellently resourced, Great Central Warehouse Library which has more than 250,000 books and approximately 400,000 electronic books and journals, alongside databases and specialist collections.

At Lincoln, the employability of our graduates is at the core of our programmes, and we offer opportunities to enhance your employability by gaining real-world experience. Working closely with industry and communities is an important part of the work within the College of Social Science, and can provide students with opportunities to gain relevant vocational experience.

The School of Sport and Exercise Science works closely with communities and practitioners including British Canoeing, Active Lincolnshire, and Lincoln City Football Club. The School of Health and Social Care has close ties with health trusts, local authorities, voluntary and private sector organisations, and service users.

All students within the College of Social Science can access the Work Opportunities Hub. The Hub is available to support students who are seeking to enhance their studies by engaging with a variety of work settings. This may be as part of their programme or as an activity during term time or holidays. The College is committed to promoting work opportunities to enable students to be work ready and to make informed future career choices.

Students at Lincoln can benefit from the research expertise of academics and may have the opportunity to engage with major research projects. Postgraduate psychology students can participate in initiatives such as 'Summer Scientist'. The event involves the participation of children between the ages of three and 10 in a series of accessible games and activities which explore different aspects of cognitive development.

Postgraduate students within the School are also part of a research team investigating perceptions of body image, using cutting-edge software and 3D scanning technology.

Research within the College of Social Science is diverse. Examples include work on violence against women and girls in the UK and India, and research into co-operative education, workplace democracy and alternative forms of higher education. Dr Catherine Bochel holds a research fellowship at the House of Commons considering key elements of public engagement.

Research groups cover a wide range of topics, and include Lincoln Law School's Lincoln Centre for Environmental Law and Justice, the Forensic and Clinical Research Group, which sits within the School of Psychology, and the School of Education's research into school education and tertiary education.

The Professional Development Centre offers continuing professional development for qualified practitioners in a variety of sectors including nursing, care, teaching, social work, legal, emergency services, criminal justice, medicine, and the third sector.

The MA Politics is designed to help students become confident researchers with the ability to explore all dimensions of the policymaking process. Students can study advanced research methods, enabling them to hone qualitative and quantitative

research skills, and supporting them to become confident researchers in their own right. There are opportunities to get involved in the School's research seminar series.

This degree offers a distinctive range of modules, and delivers an academically rigorous and contemporary programme. The course draws on the existing research and teaching expertise within the School of Social and Political Sciences.

The School aims to provide a vibrant. collegial, and friendly environment where students can benefit from support by specialist academics.

There are opportunities to supplement studies by participating in field trips to key international organisations and political institutions. In recent years, students from the School have visited New York, Washington D.C., Brussels, The Hague, Strasbourg, and Geneva. Places are limited and allocated competitively, subject to academic

criteria. Students are encouraged to register their interest early in the academic year. Students are responsible for their travel, accommodation, living, and day trip costs.

Graduates may go on to roles in research, local and central government, parliament, the civil service, law, industry, and commerce. Career opportunities may also exist in the diplomatic service, public affairs, journalism, or within charitable or not-for-profit organisations.

#### **MA Education**

The MA Education aims to further existing educators' critical understanding of their practice and enable aspiring educators to deepen their knowledge.

The Master's is a programme of advanced study for students who wish to expand their knowledge of education in general, and for those who wish to make connections between educational practice, theory, and research.

Students within the School of Education study in a vibrant and intellectually stimulating environment alongside experienced academics engaged in research that seeks to improve education.

This programme offers opportunities to learn, apply, and produce critical knowledge in the interdisciplinary field of education, with the ambition to inform and transform future educational practice, theory, policy, and institutions.

Core modules aim to support students to identify their specific research questions through a critical review of the literature; develop the requisite knowledge, understanding and practical skills in appropriate research methods; and produce a compelling piece of advanced research.

In addition to core modules, optional modules enable students to construct a programme of study shaped around their interests. Students write a 10,000-word Master's dissertation based on independent research.

Postgraduates can attend bi-weekly seminars in person or remotely.

Study schools currently take place over two weekends in October and February (Friday-Sunday), and one week in July (Monday-Friday) at the University's

Brayford Pool Campus. These events enable students to share ideas with others in the School. Students are responsible for their own travel, accommodation, and general living costs during the study schools, which can include lectures, student presentations, seminars, visiting speakers, and workshops.

Graduates may go on to work in schools, colleges, universities, local authorities, charities, prisons, and social services. The course can also prepare students for doctoral-level study in education and social research.

Successful completion of this programme can provide graduates with the eligibility to apply to the Health and Care Professions Council Register as an occupational therapist, and for membership of the Royal College of Occupational Therapists.

Students are encouraged to appreciate and understand current occupational therapy practice while being critical in their approach to developing new, innovative, and evidence-based interventions.

#### MSc Advanced Clinical Practice Primary Care/Urgent Care

These Master's programmes offer registered practitioners a flexible, bespoke, and student-centred programme of study that aims to meet their personal and professional development needs as they progress within their role towards advanced expert practice. ## MSc Healthcare in Secure Environments

This flexible Master's programme is accredited by the Royal College of General Practitioners, and focuses on the clinical and applied aspects of working in a range of secure settings, such as prisons or health services. The course has been developed to address the training and support needs of medical and nursing staff, as well as allied health professionals, including psychologists and social workers. The programme aims to provide a flexible learning environment, which can facilitate completion while students are working in applied practice.

## Law at Lincoln

The University's Lincoln Law School has a wide-ranging postgraduate portfolio to develop your legal specialism with tailored courses in international law, corporate and commercial law, and conflict and disaster law.

Our law graduates pursue careers around the world in legal practice or in business, industry, government, non-governmental organisations, and academia. For those seeking academic careers, the LLM programmes we offer provide the grounding for graduates to go on to study for an MPhil or PhD. Whatever career path you are pursuing, Lincoln Law School and our Careers and Employability team are on hand to offer expert guidance to help you achieve your objectives.

There has been an increasing demand for lawyers with the necessary knowledge of international law and international business law to provide services to clients in both transactional and litigation work. This can include commercial law firms undertaking work for multi-national corporations and those businesses involved in multijurisdictional transactions or disputes.

The School has expertise within the fields of international human rights law, international environmental law, and international legal issues, and aims to provide a strong basis for those that wish to follow a career in international law. Many governmental and international organisations, such as the United Nations, require the expertise of those with backgrounds in international law, and international corporate and commercial law.

Within the School there are expertise in criminal justice. Matthew Hall is Professor of Law and Criminal Justice, and has worked with the European Commission in the field of victimology.

On our LLM International Law programme, students can develop a

critical understanding of how the law affects all aspects of international society. This can involve trade, prosecuting crimes, and the use of force in international relations, as well as the understanding of human rights and environmental law. This knowledge is applicable in a variety of career paths.

The LLM International Corporate and Commercial Law course seeks to help students develop an in-depth knowledge of the law and the regulations which govern corporate and commercial activities across national borders. The programme aims to prepare students to respond to the changing and dynamic nature of legal relations between corporations, individuals, and states. Students can gain the necessary knowledge and skills that are required to conduct transnational work within business and industry.

Our programme in **LLM Conflict and Disaster Law** is aimed at students who wish to build on their knowledge and interest in law in the realms of conflict, humanitarian aid, and disaster response management.

The programme is designed to equip students with a critical understanding of how the law, policy, and practice impacts responses to conflict and disaster in both human and natural situations. # **Psychology**

Lincoln's School of Psychology offers a number of research and taught degrees in areas including forensic, clinical, and developmental psychology, delivered by academic teams with wide-ranging expertise.


Our graduates pursue careers in a variety of settings including the police, NHS and private hospitals, GP surgeries and health centres, community mental health teams, prison and probation services, care services, schools and universities, social services, children's services, and forensic settings.

The School has an active research base with expertise in cognitive and behavioural development, applied clinical and forensic psychology, and cognitive neuroscience. Students can get involved in a range of research studies taking place within the School.

Psychology students at Lincoln can benefit from a range of modern facilities within our Sarah Swift Building, including a sleep laboratory, motor and EEG laboratories, a psychophysiology laboratory, and our 'BabyLab' – a specialist area for the study of child development.

The MSc Developmental Psychology at Lincoln focuses on the social, emotional, and cognitive development of children, and is designed for graduates and practising psychologists who wish to specialise in child development. Current research interests within the School include cognitive development, language acquisition, autism, motor development, and child injury prevention. Graduate career opportunities may include hospital and care settings, schools, social services and children's services, or further study.

Our MSc Forensic Psychology course focuses on the application of psychological theory to a range of



contexts relevant to the criminal justice system, and the assessment and rehabilitation of offenders. The MSc forms Stage 1 of the requirements for training and qualifying as a Forensic Psychologist in the UK. Graduates may pursue careers in many different forensic settings and roles. A number of previous graduates have gone on to undertake a PhD in a research area relevant to forensic psychology.

The DClinPsy Psychology is for students who wish to undertake a career as a clinical psychologist. The course is a multi-agency collaboration between Derbyshire Healthcare Foundation NHS Trust, Lincolnshire Partnership Foundation NHS Trust, Nottinghamshire Healthcare NHS Trust and the universities of Lincoln and Nottingham. The course aims to develop students' confidence to perform as highly effective clinicians, and in leadership and consultancy roles. The programme is approved by the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC) and accredited by the British Psychological Society (BPS). Currently, only trainees who are funded through NHS training commissions are accepted to the programme. #### MSc by Research/MPhil/PhD

**Psychology** offers the opportunity to conduct independent research into an area of psychology of your choice, and produce an extended thesis with guidance from two academic supervisors. Research areas include evolution and developmental psychology; forensic and clinical psychology; identity and psychologies; and perception, action and cognition. Research students within the School can attend research group meetings and weekly research seminars to encourage collaboration and knowledge of the different research interests within the department. A research-focused programme of study can provide an excellent foundation for a career in academia or research, as well as for senior roles within psychology.

#### MSc Psychological Research

Methods enables students to develop a firm scientific basis in psychological research methods. Example modules for study include Applied Neuropsychology, Basic Programming, and Perception and Cognition. Students undertake a thesis with the aim of submitting it to a peer-reviewed journal. This programme is designed for students who are looking for the opportunity to develop specialist knowledge and a solid research skills base for their work or further study.


