Teaching Excellence Framework – Gold for Liverpool Hope University

The Government's Teaching Excellence Framework (TEF) is a scheme for recognising excellent teaching, in addition to existing national quality requirements for universities and other higher education providers.

- Supportive environments and ways of learning
- Whether studying has enabled students to fulfil their potential, gain employment or go on to further study.

By gaining a gold rating, Liverpool Hope is:

"It is of the highest quality [universities] found in the UK."

Only one in five higher education institutions achieved a gold rating, with Liverpool Hope University being the only university in the city to receive the highest rating.

The assessment highlighted a range of activities Liverpool Hope does well, including:


- Outstanding levels of stretch provided by good curriculum design and extra-curricular activities

Live, study and play at Hope Park

Liverpool Hope's largest campus, Hope Park, is a friendly educational village with places to live, work, study, eat and relax. It is situated in a leafy suburb of Liverpool, just four miles from the city centre. With major investment over recent years, the campus now consists of traditional architecture alongside state-of-the-art, modern, purpose-built buildings.

Hope Park offers all our students excellent facilities in beautiful surroundings and a warm student welcome.

The campus is home to the Faculties of Education, Science and the majority of Arts and Humanities Departments. It is also home to the Sports and Health Sciences Avenue, which has excellent sports and recreation facilities for all our students to use.

Meet at Our Place

Our Place is the focus for student social activity on the Hope Park campus. It includes an American-style pizza restaurant, smoothie and coffee shop, and plays host to live music and comedy nights. It also has places to relax with friends and play pool or video games.

Fresh Hope

Our Place opens up into Fresh Hope – the main restaurant on site. It offers a variety of hot and cold options, including a carvery, an extremely popular noodle bar, freshly prepared deli sandwiches and wraps, and a salad bar.

There are other coffee shops and cafés scattered all around the campus, including a new health food café in the Sports Complex, as well as a shop where you can buy drinks, snacks, newspapers and magazines.





Be inspired by our Creative Campus

Our Creative Campus is close to Liverpool city centre and is home to our School of Creative and Performing Arts. Here, you can learn your craft in the inspirational setting of Grade II-listed buildings and state-of-the-art performance spaces. The University has invested heavily in this campus, unveiling a new Arts Centre, Graphic Design Studio, Fabrication Lab and extensive student spaces during summer 2018. The transformed spaces include two theatres, two dance studios, two black box performance spaces, a music technology laboratory, a recording studio, and studios for painting, sculpture, wood, ceramics, metal and textiles.

The Cornerstone Building

The Cornerstone Building has undergone an extensive renovation, transforming the ground floor into an impressive social space, complete with a food court and breakout areas. The centrepiece of The Cornerstone is The Great Hall, a stunning example of open space suitable for a multitude of events, including student exhibitions and guest lectures. The building is home to fantastic facilities for the development of students' artwork, including studios, kilns, workshops and metalwork studios. It also houses The Cornerstone Gallery, which supplements the student experience via a series of contemporary art exhibitions, student-led seminars and some of the best examples of current professional practice.

The Capstone Building

The Capstone Building is home to The Capstone Theatre, Liverpool Hope's dedicated performance venue, which provides an international music and arts programme throughout the year, including the Liverpool International Jazz Festival.

Liverpool Hope University is one of only six All-Steinway Schools in English higher education. The theatre is an acoustically excellent space housing a Steinway D Grand Piano, often described as the best piano in the world.

Since opening its doors, The Capstone Theatre has staged concerts and performances by leading national and international musicians and artists, as well as student performances.

Arts Centre

The newest addition to the campus, the Arts Centre features a large refurbished warehouse space as well as smaller studios for Fine and Applied Art students to hone their practice.

Angel Field

The Creative Campus's buildings are all set within the tranquil Angel Field – a stunning garden that is a great place to study and relax with friends. The Renaissance-style garden has won six design awards and was described by *Country Life Magazine* as '...one of the best examples of conceptual landscape design in the country'.

The amazing city of Liverpool

Liverpool is a city like no other. From world-famous architecture and magnificent museums, to music legends revolutionising popular culture, Liverpool has always been a hub of creativity. Through spectacular festivals, dramatic sporting attractions and unique art, the city continues to be a gateway for UK culture, attracting millions of visitors every year. There is something for everyone in the city that has been voted one of Britain's best travel destinations (Telegraph, 2018).

Music

Liverpool is Europe's Capital of Music. It's impossible to imagine Liverpool without music – or music without Liverpool. Birthplace of The Beatles, the world's most famous pop group, the city is home to a host of first-class festivals, including Sound City, Liverpool International Music Festival, Africa Oyé and Liverpool Loves. The world-leading dance festival Creamfields is held just outside the city each year and attracts some of the biggest DJs in the industry.

The city's M&S Bank Arena Liverpool hosts everything, from big name acts like Rihanna, Lady Gaga, Arctic Monkeys, Justin Bieber and Drake, to major entertainment events, including the MTV Europe Music Awards and the MOBO Awards.

There is also a thriving nightlife with all tastes catered for, from the latest clubs to 70s-themed bars and live music venues.

Did you know?

The University has a partnership with The Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra, which provides classical and contemporary music performances throughout the year.

Culture

We have working relationships with a wide range of cultural venues around the city. Liverpool's many art galleries range from the Walker, which contains one of Europe's outstanding collections of fine and decorative art, to Tate Liverpool, one of the largest galleries of modern and contemporary art outside London.

Liverpool Empire Theatre attracts all the latest touring theatre productions, while the Playhouse, Everyman, Royal Court and Unity theatres offer a rich and varied programme of classic and contemporary productions.

The city also boasts an array of world-class museums, including the International Slavery Museum, Merseyside Maritime Museum and the Museum of Liverpool.

Sport

With the Grand National, golf and – of course – football, there are plenty of sporting events to keep even the most avid sports fan entertained. Liverpool is home to two Premier League football teams; what better place to come to watch the match?

Shopping

Liverpool city centre is full of shops, with all the high street names available. The 42-acre Liverpool One development provides a stunning shopping complex in the heart of the city, with 40 individually designed buildings and over 150,000 square metres of shopping. Liverpool also has a range of vibrant independent retailers, and student-friendly shops offering one-of-a-kind pieces and vintage finds.

Home sweet home

Living on campus in one of our halls of residence is a great way for you to become part of the Hope community. Living in halls will give you the best start to your new life, and provides you with a secure and fun place to live while you progress with your studies. Hope will soon become your home away from home.

We have three accommodation sites: Hope Park, Creative Campus and Aigburth Park Student Village.

Living at Hope Park

Hope Park is the largest teaching campus. The 532 rooms available are reserved for first year undergraduates and include both en-suite and shared facilities rooms.

The en-suite halls at Hope Park provide you with both privacy and comfort.

All rooms contain a single bed, double wardrobe, study area, chair, drawers and shelves, plus an en-suite shower room and toilet.

The rooms are arranged into flats of five, all sharing a large kitchen and dining area, which is equipped with a fridge-freezer, cooker, microwave, kettle, toaster, iron, ironing board and vacuum cleaner. The common room on the ground floor can be used for meetings, social events or just relaxing. Accessible rooms are available in these halls.

We also have six traditional halls of residence with shared bathrooms, providing an informal and friendly environment for students who enjoy socialising and making friends.

Four of these halls are located in the historic Grade II-listed Hilda Constance Allen Building, or the 'Harry Potter Halls' as they are fondly known by our students. The rooms have period features, leaded windows and window seats. Many look out onto the Rector's Lawn with its landscaped borders.

Angela and Austin Halls are purpose-built halls located close to Fresh Hope and Our Place, the University's main eating and drinking venues.

All of these halls provide single study bedrooms with all the essentials you need.





Living at the Creative Campus

The Creative Campus is the second of Liverpool Hope's teaching campuses and includes the historic Cornerstone Building, new Arts Centre, and The Capstone Building and Theatre, as well as Gerard Manley Hopkins Hall of Residence. It is situated just outside the city centre and is convenient for all amenities associated with city living, while being away from the main hustle and bustle.

The modern, purpose-built hall is situated in Angel Field, a beautiful landscaped garden surrounding The Cornerstone and Capstone Buildings, where Liverpool Hope's Creative and Performing Arts courses are taught.

Accessible rooms are available in this hall.

Living at Aigburth Park Student Village

Aigburth Park is a residential campus approximately three miles from the city centre and Hope Park. The halls are set in private landscaped gardens and there is a wealth of shops, banks, bars and restaurants, plus a library located nearby. Liverpool's most famous park, Sefton Park, is also in the immediate vicinity. There are regular buses into the city centre and to Hope Park, plus St Michael's train station is close by.

St Michael's at Aigburth Park provides four blocks of purpose-built accommodation. All rooms are single occupation and include internet access.

Resident Tutors

The thought of going to university can be both exciting and daunting. You will be taking on a new academic challenge and probably living away from home for the first time – a huge step for anyone. Remember, everyone coming to university feels exactly the same and our aim is to ensure that you have the best possible experience, both in and out of class.

To help support you, we have a team of Resident Tutors at all of our halls who will be your mentors during your time there. They provide learning support and advice whenever you need it, and organise social events such as dining-in nights, which are included in your accommodation costs and are a great way to meet new people.

Sporting life – something for everyone

Hope Park Sports opened in September 2016 and features:

- A main sports hall with six courts and a viewing gallery
- Squash courts
- Gym and fitness rooms
- Strength and conditioning suites
- Tennis courts
- 3G pitches

Based within the Faculty of Science, the Sports Complex forms part of the Health Sciences Avenue, integrating health and sports sciences and providing excellent opportunities for leisure, fitness, study and research.

To ensure the sports facilities are easy for you to use, there are no monthly fees – a single yearly registration fee of £25 is all that is required, and then the gym facilities, courts and fitness classes are all free for you to use!

In addition to the activities in the Sports Complex, Liverpool Hope Students' Union also has a vast range of sporting societies for you to join. These include Gaelic football, netball, football, hockey, badminton and even cheerleading. The Residential Life Team also run a series of regular activities, such as local walks, orienteering and multi-games.

State-of-the-art sport, health and sports science facilities

Our Health Sciences Building opened in 2016 and features specialist laboratory spaces dedicated to nutrition, genomics, cell biology and psychology, along with laboratories and space for sport and exercise science.

The building houses a 25-metre sprint track with force meters and motion capture for biomechanical analysis, a phlebotics lab for blood sampling, treadmills and BODPODs for physiological analysis, and a Dual-energy X-ray Absorptiometry (DEXA) scanner for assessing bone and muscle health. There is also a double-height robotics suite and engineering lab to aid the building and testing of drones.

Psychology labs include motor control capture and vision and colour labs, as well as cognitive and neuro-behaviour suites. The building also includes space for research synergies with psychology and sport.

Nutrition labs with food analysis and testing facilities, two large bioscience and environmental science labs, and a suite of dedicated research labs for the study of molecular biology, microbiology, cell biology, nutrition, molecular genetics, tissue culture and bioinformatics takes up the first floor.



Our libraries

The Sheppard-Worlock and Creative Campus Libraries, along with other learning spaces across the campuses, are hives of activity for individual and group study.

You will have access to a wide range of study environments and resources to meet the needs of your chosen course. The Sheppard-Worlock Library occupies over 4,000 square metres and contains a core print collection of more than 350,000 items, alongside a print journal archive and subject-specific collections. There has also been a substantial investment in full text online resources including e-journals, e-books and databases, most of which can be accessed both on and off campus. A team of dedicated Faculty Librarians can provide training and support to help you make the most of these resources.

The Sheppard-Worlock Library includes relaxed spaces for students to study, as well as specially designed PC workstations to provide working areas with room for your books and papers. Group work spaces have screens that you can link your laptop to for practising presentations and sharing work.

There are dedicated silent study areas and quiet spaces for reading, with Wi-Fi access for laptops and other devices. The Sheppard-Worlock Library has an environmentally controlled vault dedicated to special collections and an archives reading room, as well as Chapters Café serving drinks and snacks.

Peer academic writing and study skills support are available from experienced students, to help you improve and develop your writing skills. Study Skills support includes note-taking, organising your work and resources, timekeeping and exam preparation. Support is available one-to-one, through workshops and online resources developed by the Hope team.

A centre for research and learning

Liverpool Hope places great emphasis on the bringing together of research excellence and top-quality teaching. This is facilitated by a community of academics and scholars who are of the highest calibre, with experts recruited from around the world.

In the national Research Excellence Framework (REF), more than a third of research produced at Liverpool Hope was rated as world-leading (4*) or internationally excellent (3*). The Times Higher Education's analysis of the REF has also ranked us fourth in the North West for research intensity. For more information about our REF success, visit: www.hope.ac.uk/ref

This research excellence informs our teaching and helps you to develop into a rounded and employable graduate.

The University has a number of research centres. These include, but are by no means limited to:

- Socio-Economic and Applied Research for Change (SEARCH)
- Centre for Applicable Mathematics and System Sciences
- Centre for Education and Policy Analysis (CEPA)
- Centre for Culture and Disability Studies (CCDS)
- The Andrew F. Walls Centre for the Study of African and Asian Christianity
- The Archbishop Desmond Tutu Centre for War and Peace Studies.

The University has recently made significant and strategic investment in its research environment in the form of the Vice-Chancellor's doctoral scholarships, and has recruited high-calibre students to pursue PhD studies. Some examples of exciting research projects as part of this initiative include:

- Robotics and its applications in the field of medicine
- Large-scale computational models of the brain to understand conditions such as Alzheimer's and other neurological diseases
- Study of the management of European security networks
- The relationship between music and the anti-Fascist movement in post-war Britain.



Student support

Starting university is the beginning of a new and exciting phase of your life and we are here to support and guide you from the moment you arrive until after you graduate.

Student Support and Well-being

The Student Support and Well-being team is based in the Gateway Building at Hope Park. They provide an integrated one-stop shop for well-being support services, which means you don't get passed around between departments. Services include everything from financial advice, access to counselling and mental well-being support, to careers and employability guidance.

We have a dedicated senior member of staff – the Pro Vice-Chancellor (Student Life and Learning) Dr Penny Haughan – whose responsibility it is to oversee the whole student experience. This ensures you are given a voice and supported throughout your time with us.

Our priority is to make your time at Liverpool Hope an enjoyable and successful experience, providing you with help and support when you need it.

Academic and learning support

At Liverpool Hope, we offer academic support from both your academic subject tutors and personal academic support tutors based within each Faculty. If you are living in student accommodation, your Resident Tutor will also be able to offer you guidance with your studies.

Writing mentors, who are Masters and PhD students, are available to offer support to help you with essay planning, developing your academic writing style and understanding assignment feedback.

Study Skills support can help with note taking, organising your work and resources, timekeeping and exam preparation.

Support for students with a disability

We are committed to enabling equality of opportunity in education for students, and will take reasonable steps to meet both the general need for access and the specific requirements of individuals with additional support needs. The University works with disabled students to ensure they are not disadvantaged as a result of their disability.

The Learning Support Team provides advice and assistance to both prospective and current students, with everything from applying for Disabled Student Allowances to helping ensure that any appropriate adjustments are made to support a positive transition into the Liverpool Hope community.

Before accepting a place, disabled applicants are encouraged to explore how the University might be able to meet any additional study support or accommodation needs they may have. This should be done at the earliest opportunity by contacting the Learning Support Team.



Global Hope

We offer a wide range of degrees, from Undergraduate level to Postgraduate taught masters and Postgraduate research degrees, as well as a number of Continuing Professional Development courses.

Single Honours degrees

If you choose to study a Single Honours degree, you are choosing to study one main subject area. Single Honours degrees are a good choice if you have a particular subject area you want to study in more depth.

Combined Honours degrees

If you choose to study a Combined Honours degree, you are choosing to study two subject areas equally. Combined Honours degrees are a good choice if you are interested in more than one subject area.

Year in Industry degrees

Some of our degrees can be studied with a year spent in industry. This placement year is additional to your degree and gives you the opportunity to gain valuable workplace experience before you graduate.

Part-time study

Most of Liverpool Hope's undergraduate programmes are available for study on a part-time basis, with the exception of the degree in Social Work and the Primary Education with Qualified Teacher Status (QTS) course.

Part-time study normally doubles an Honours degree programme to twice its full-time duration i.e. six years. Most part-time students opt to study for a Combined Honours degree programme and take their two majors in alternate years.


